Tactical Exercise At YFPC Slated For Thursday

The Yankton Police Department and the Yankton Federal Prison Camp (YFPC), along with personnel from several other state and local agencies, will be conducting a full scale tactical exercise on and near the federal prison grounds in Yankton Thursday, April 25. The purpose of the drill is to evaluate the readiness of the agencies' collaborative efforts in the event similar incidents should occur at any local facility.

Full details of the operation will not be released prior to the exercise. Traffic will be affected on some streets near the YFPC grounds, including closure of 12th Street, from Walnut to Douglas and from Douglas to Mulberry between 7 a.m.-3 p.m.

"The purpose of such a drill is to collectively exercise what we know and identify what we may need to improve in a response," says YFPC Public Information Officer Todd Cowman. "We will conduct a joint debriefing following the exercise and formulate plans to address safety and effectiveness going forward."

Additional agencies involved in the exercise include the Yankton County Sheriff's Office, Yankton County Emergency Medical Services, Yankton County Emergency Management, Vermillion Police Department, Clay Area Emergency Communications, South Dakota Highway Patrol, South Dakota DCI and South Dakota Department of Corrections.

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Mo. River Sedimentation Presentation Open To Public

The public is invited to learn more about the growing effects of sedimentation in the Missouri River during a presentation tonight (Wednesday) in Yankton.

The Missouri Sedimentation Action Coalition (MSAC) encourages the public to attend the meeting, said MSAC executive director Sandy Stockholm. The meeting begins at 5:30 p.m. in the lower level Market-place Cafe of the Riverfront Event Center in downtown Yankton.

"Some displays will be set up, and people are welcome to come early," Stockholm said, adding the doors will open at 5 p.m. Newsletters, facts sheets and other hand-outs will be available.

Tim Cowman, director of the Missouri River Institute in Vermillion, will give a special presentation entitled "Historical and Predicted Future Sediment Accumulation in the Niobrara River Delta and Lewis and Clark Lake Headwaters."

Cowman said much of the current sediment information is written as reports and spreadsheets geared for engineers and scientists. His presentation will include artwork and pictures geared toward the general public.

"These visuals show the state of the Missouri River before Gavins Point Dam was built and how sediment accumulation transformed the area after the dam was built," he said.

The public can interact with Cowman at the meeting, Stockholm said.

"Tim's presentation will last about 45 minutes," she said. "We want to allow some time for questions. We will open with a business meeting, but we will keep it as short as possible because we want to focus on the program about Lewis and Clark sedimentation."

The sediment issue received national publicity last week when the American Rivers organization listed the Niobrara River as one of the nation's 10 Most Endangered Rivers.

Wednesday's meeting has drawn inquiries from as far away as Omaha and Lincoln, Stockholm said. Both private citizens and government officials have indicated they plan to attend.

"I think we've had more publicity surrounding this meeting, so it might be one of the better attended," Stockholm said.

"I loved the idea of being able to see 1 million of something in one place," he said. "I also wrote similar books on measuring 1 million and wrote about how long it would take someone to count up to a million."

Schwartz gave the advice to parents and teachers that they can use graphs in a lot of his books, which help go deeper into the topics found in his books.

"There are a lot of questions that can be asked from the books I have published," he said. "You can have kids create their own questions, then answer them."

Schwartz added that parents and teachers need to encourage their children and students to read.

"Literature is such a big gateway to other subjects, including math," he said. "The learning process is so powerful, and parents and teachers need to engage their kids and students in that process."
