South Dakota residents are encouraged to cast their vote for the state's Outstanding Senior Volunteer. ARLINGTON, Va. — The Yankton Federal Prison Camp is one of two South Dakota employers selected as semifinalists for the 2013 Secretary of Defense Employer Support Freedom Award.

The Freedom Award is the DoD's highest honor for employers that provide extraordinary support to their Guard and Reserve employees.

This year, 138 semifinalists stood out among 2,899 employers nominated by a Guard or Reserve employee.

The other semifinalist is Black Hills Corporation, Rapid City. ESGR will announce the 2013 Freedom Award finalists in May after a review board comprised of military and civilian leaders selects the 30 most supportive employers. Up to 15 award recipients will be announced early this summer and honored in Washington in September at the 18th annual Secretary of Defense Employer Support Freedom Award ceremony.
