• South Dakotians, farmers and others, will gain nothing by moving to California, S. H. Collins, director of the South Dakota state employment service, said in a statement issued here (Aberdeen). Word received from a farm placement supervisor of California, he said, indicates that the west coast state already has a serious labor surplus.
• A survey to determine the prevalence of mottled enamel of the teeth in South Dakota is being conducted in many schools by Dr. H. T. Dean, dental surgeon from the U. S. public health service, and the state health department, W. W. Towne, state sanitary engineer, announced. Towne explained that mottled enamel is the chalky white or brownish coloring found on permanent teeth.

50 YEARS AGO
Friday, April 26, 1963
• Some 113.3 million Americans will lose an hour apiece Sunday-all because of Ben Franklin. When he was ambassador to France almost 200 years ago, thrifty Ben awoke unusually early one morning and found daylight streaming through his window while most of the citizens of the city still slept. Frugal Ben worried about the "wasted" daylight and conceived a

plan to conserve the daylight by advancing clocks one hour. This was the germ of Daylight Saving Time.
• Yankton people having fire extinguishers in their business places and homes were reminded today by Fire Chief Howard Frick to note the date on which their extinguisher was last checked. They should be checked once each year, the fire chief said.

• Wet, slushy snow is providing welcome moisture, offering an advantage to farmers who are preparing to plant their crops, but trees and newborn calves are bearing the brunt of the weather's disadvantages. "Remembering April 14 two years ago, people in Yankton lost evergreen trees because of the wet, heavy snow," said Tom Draper, district forester. "We face that potential again, but the key is wind. If we can get through today and tonight without it blowing too hard, everything should be Ok."

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures rose Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.
Wheat for May delivery rose 9.5 cents to \$7.0125 a bushel; May corn rose 5.75 cents to \$6.4525 a bushel; May oats rose 4.25 cents to \$3.945 a bushel; while May soybeans jumped

19.5 cents to \$14.235 a bushel. Beef and pork prices also rose on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
June live cattle rose 0.83 cent to \$1.229 a pound; May feeder cattle rose 1.10 cent to \$1.422 a pound; June lean hogs added 0.82 cent to 91.82 cents a pound.
