Towne explained that mottled enamel is the chalky white or brownish coloring found on permanent teeth.

• Some 113.3 million Americans will lose an hour apiece Sunday-all because of Ben Franklin. When he was ambassador to France almost 200 years ago, thrifty Ben awoke unusually early one morning and found daylight streaming through his window while most of he citizens of the city still slept. Frugal Ben worried about the "wasted" daylight and conceived a plan to conserve the daylight by advancing clocks one hour. This was the germ of Daylight Saving Time. • Yankton people having fire extinguishers in their business places and homes were reminded today by Fire Chief Howard Frick to note the date on which their extinguisher was last checked. They should be checked once each year, the fire chief said.
