The drive south on Interstate 29 was also an adventure.

"I went the speed limit, don't worry," he said, smiling.

Though archery is a growing sport in Brazil, Cesar de Oliveira said it has already been "eyeopening" to watch the younger archers compete in Yankton.

"This complex is wonderful, and the coaches have a lot of knowledge to help you," he said. "We try to get more kids in school to do archery, but it's getting better."

"Everything is so big here," Karen said. "The streets are bigger and broader, and you can't walk everywhere like you can back home.


