Man Sentenced To Prison After Violating Probation For Grand Theft Case

A Yankton man was given a two-year prison sentence Monday for violating his probation sentence for grand theft.

In November, Matthew Eugene Thompson received a suspended imposition of sentence and five years of probation after pleading guilty to dozens of thefts in the area. He admitted to approximately 30 incidents of camper and boat battery thefts, as well as gas thefts in Gayville, Irene, Yankton and the Lewis and Clark Lake area.

Grand theft is a Class 4 felony punishable by up to 10 years imprisonment in the state penitentiary. In addition, a \$20,000 fine may be imposed.

In addition to suspending imposition of a 10-year sentence and putting him on probation in November, Circuit Judge Glen Eng ordered Thompson to pay a \$1,000 fine and restitution to victims.

Thompson was also to spend a total of 180 days in

jail, which included 20 days in jail each July during the next five years.

However, Thompson was arrested in March for possession of marijuana, possession of drug paraphernalia and possession with intent to distribute marijuana.

He only pleaded guilty to possession of marijuana.

When Thompson appeared before Eng on Monday, he was sentenced to 10 years in prison with eight of them suspended for violating his probation.

A two-year sentence was also imposed for possession of marijuana (more than two ounces). Eng said the sentences will be served concurrently, meaning Thompson essentially has a sentence of two years.

Eng gave Thompson credit for the 127 days he has already spent locked up since his arrest last year for grand theft.

Thompson will also have to pay some fines, court costs and attorney fees.

5 Arrested In Connection With Area Thefts

The Yankton County Sheriff's Office has arrested five suspects in connection with area thefts.

Sheriff Jim Vlahakis said good detective work by his staff led to the arrests of the following five people:

- Chase Brummer, 19, Yankton, was arrested Friday for two counts of second-degree burglary and two counts of grand theft (over \$1,000).
- Tyler Garcia, 19, Yankton, was arrested Friday for two counts of second-degree burglary and two counts of grand theft (over \$1,000).
- A 15-year-old Yankton male was arrested Thursday for second-degree burglary, three counts of grand theft

(more than \$1,000), possession/receiving stolen property (\$400-\$1,000) and third-degree burglary.

- A 15-year-old Yankton male was arrested Friday for three counts of grand theft (more than \$1,000), third-degree burglary, possession/receiving stolen property (\$400-\$1,000) and two counts of second-degree burglary.
- A 16-year-old Yankton male was arrested Friday for two counts of second-degree burglary, three counts of grand theft (more than \$1,000), first-degree petty theft and criminal entry of a motor vehicle.

According to Vlahakis, the suspects are believed to have been involved in burglaries at two

residences and an out building, as well as the break-in of a car parked along Deer Boulevard.

"They took safes out of the two residences containing cash, coins and so forth," Vlahakis said. "In one of the burglaries, they took about \$5,000 worth of hunting equipment."

Additional evidence has been found that suggests the suspects were also involved in burglaries in Cedar County, Neb.

"We've notified Cedar County authorities," Vlahakis said. "The investigation continues, and I anticipate more arrests."
