If you follow me on Facebook or Twitter, you've probably read my spiel: Mount Marty College needs a new athletic fieldhouse or wellness center or sports complex (call it whatever you want) I bring it up again because of this week's Onward Yankton announcement. You know the one; where you can submit the next 'big' idea and win \$10,000.

Partly because the issue has been on my mind a lot lately, but my initial idea when I heard the theme for Onward Yankton was the athletic need at Mount Marty. Quite a few people got back to me with support for the idea, while one person asked the fair question, 'How would that benefit the entire

But you know what? If done right, an athletic complex at Mount Marty College could be utilized by everyone in Yankton. The Dakota Wesleyan University example I used in my last Daily Dose applies perfectly here. The Mitchell-based college broke ground last September for a \$10.5 million health and wellness center, which includes a Community Health and Fitness Center. There's no reason Mount

Marty couldn't finance and construct a similar facility. You've already heard me say such a building is needed at Mount Marty. And I'm far from the only person to have ever said this. All you need to do is scan the websites of the 10 other schools in the Great Plains Athletic Conference to see that, quite honestly, Mount Marty is far behind. Concordia and Doane, for example, have athletic centers that are open to the public (specifically the weight room). A number of other schools have complex that feature an indoor track and state-of-the-art weight rooms, both of which cannot be found at Mount Marty.

Going back to the whole idea of the Onward Yankton campaign, and its pledge for a search for something to benefit everyone, I made the following point to the person who asked how a fieldhouse at Mount Marty would better the entire community: Improved resources at MMC raise the profile of the athletic department which raises the profile of the college which means increased support within the community. And so, if anyone else wants to submit this idea to Onward Yankton, I'll split the \$10,000 with you

Area Athletes Among Inductees For Nebraska HS Sports Hall

LINCOLN, Neb. – Hartington Cedar Catholic great Russ Hochstein, Newcastle standout Tonya (Kneifl) Gordon and former University of South Dakota track and field star Lionel McPhaull are among the 18 individuals selected for induction into the Nebraska High School Sports Hall of Fame in 2015. The induction will take place on Oct. 4 at Lincoln East High School with a reception at noon, followed by the ceremony at 1;30 p.m.

Hochstein, a 4-year letterman in football, basketball and track, made the Blue Chip Illustrated All-America football team as a senior then went on to an All-American career playing for the Nebraska Cornhuskers. He was the second NFL player to win a Super Bowl ring in three consecutive years playing for Tampa Bay and New England.

The state track meet's gold standard, Gordon set high jump, long jump and triple jump records while amassing more points at the state meet than any other female athlete. She won 12 Class D gold medals, two all-class gold medals and was never beaten in the high jump or triple jump during her high school career. She scored 1,987 points in basketball, which still ranks in the top 15, and led Newcastle to the 1994 state title.

A three-sport letterman, McPhaull's signature sport was track where he was a seven-time gold medalist, setting the state record in the 400. At the University of South Dakota, he was a 10-time All-American. He competed professionally for two years.

Also selected were athletes Bob Green (Creighton Prep, 1978), Calvin Jones (Omaha Central, 1990), Jenny Kropp-Goess (Grand Island Central Catholic, 1998), Danny Noonan (Lincoln Northeast, 1983), Alice Schmidt (Elkhorn, 2000), Dean Thompson (Omaha Westside, 1980), Jan Wall (Lincoln Northeast, 1958) and P.J. Wiseman (Ralston, 1992).

being done in a year ago by UConn guard Shabazz Napier in the regional final. While the coach wouldn't compare either of his starters to Napier, he sure has plenty of confidence in what they can do as a tandem.

"They're two coaches' sons, and they act like them," Izzo said. "That makes them very valuable to this team.

The Spartans are a bit undersized, which will become an even bigger headache if they get past Duke and face Kentucky (38-0) in the championship game (assuming the Wildcats beat Wisconsin in the other semi).

Michigan State's playing rotation includes only two players taller than 6-foot-6; Kentucky's nine-deep behemoth has only one player

shorter than that. Everyone struggles to match up with the Wildcats' front line, but the 6-0 Trice and 5-10 Nairn would also have their hands full against Aaron and Andrew Harrison.

Don't expect the Spartans to be intimidated by anyone, however.

After being seeded seventh by the NCAA selection committee, they opened the tournament with an impressive victory over a Georgia team that gave Kentucky all it could handle late in the regular season. After that, Michigan State knocked off a second seed (Virginia), a third seed (Oklahoma) and a fourth seed (Louisville) the toughest road conquered by any of the Final Four teams.

"They've had an underdog mentality all March, people counting them out because they had a couple of losses," Duke's Quinn Cook said. "It's going to be a here for a reason."

If the Spartans need another shot of confidence, they've certainly taken note of the team that won the title a year ago.

UConn, which denied Michigan State a trip to the Final Four, went on to take the championship as a No. 7 seed.

"It tells you that no seed matters," Izzo said. "It's how your guys play. The energy that our guys have played with, the enthusiasm, I'm amazed. We had two practices at home (before traveling to Indy). We got better in those practices. That shouldn't happen at this time of year."

Better keep an eye on Sparty at this Final Four.
