#### **Pope Praises** Iran Deal In **Easter Message**

VATICAN CITY (AP) — In an Easter peace wish, Pope Francis on Sunday praised the framework nuclear agreement with Iran as an opportunity to make the world safer, while expressing deep worry about bloodshed in Libya, Yemen, Syria, Iraq, Nigeria and elsewhere in Africa.

Cautious hope ran through Francis' "Urbi et Orbi" Easter message, a kind of papal commentary on the state of the world's affairs, which he delivered from the central balcony of St. Peter's Square.

He had just celebrated Mass in rain-whipped St. Peter's Square for tens of thousands of people, who huddled under umbrellas or braved the downpour in thin, plas-

tic rain-slickers. Easter day is "so beautiful, and so ugly because of the rain," Francis said after Mass about Christianity's most important feast day. He expressed thanks for the flowers which bedecked the square and which were donated by the Netherlands, but the bright hues of the azaleas and other blossoms seemed muted by the gray skies.

## Lawmakers **Have Summer** Homework **Assignments**

SIOUX FALLS - State lawmakers and interested groups will spend the summer investigating several problems in South Dakota that could be solved with legislation during the 2016 session in Pierre.

Legislators will meet in late April to determine topics to study over the summer, and several groups already have been formed or extended.

Such studies frequently germinate into concrete legislation. The road and bridge funding hike that lawmakers more than \$80 million in its first year came out of a summer study group on highway needs. Lawmakers also passed a study-spawned bill this session mandating that certain insurance plans cover a costly but effective treatment for children with autism and would lay the groundwork for further coverage in the future.

Here are some of the upcoming efforts:

#### **JOLENE'S LAW**

The Jolene's Law Task Force during the 2015 session put forward mandatory reporter legislation meant to make sure an account of

abuse doesn't become jumbled as it passes through multiple people on its way to authorities.

The work group also asked for reauthorization from the Legislature to continue studying the topic of child sexual abuse, but the bill suffered a surprise defeat in a legislative committee. Gov. Dennis Daugaard stepped in and folded the task force into the executive branch so it could keep working.

The task force is named after Jolene Loetscher, of Sioux Falls, who was a victim of sexual abuse as a teenager and has talked publicly

Loetscher has said the task force wants to continue working on a broader public awareness campaign in part about the signs of abuse and to improve how K-12 students, volunteers, teachers and parents are educated about abuse, among other initiatives.

#### **EDUCATION**

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## **Springfield Vet Memorial Far Ahead Of Schedule**

Springfield Veterans Memorial isn't going according to plan. Actually, it's moving far beyond expectations.

"We're probably a year ahead of

schedule," said chairwoman Connie Allen. "We're to the point where we're going to hold our groundbreaking ceremony on Memorial Day and the dedication in October."

The memorial will be located in Terrace Park overlooking the Missouri River. The gray granite spire will stand 22 feet

tall, sporting a lit top which will be visible miles away. The black granite panels will stand 5-8 feet tall and break into a zig-zag design at the top. The sloping tablets will symbolize the undulating hills and scenery surrounding the site as well as the broken lives caused by war and

The Springfield Veterans Memorial committee formed in 2010 and kicked off its efforts Memorial Day 2011.
