day, little new information was available for the public.

Repeated requests for information from several agencies were not answered. All contacted referred requests for information back to the agency in charge.

The only official comment from law enforcement on Tuesday was a press release issued by Police Chief Brian Paulson at 4:30 p.m. It read: "Staff continues to search for

# **Dakota Plains Renews** Napa Junction Interest

#### YAPG Proposes TIF Process To County Commission

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Dakota Plains has renewed interest in locating a facility near Napa Junction, northwest of Yankton, and a Tax Increment Finance (TIF) district would be key to such a development.

This was the main message Yankton Area Progressive Growth (YAPG) executive vice president Jeff Jones brought to Tuesday's meeting of the

Yankton County Commission.

"We have been approached, again, by Dakota Plains about the possibility of building a grain facility at Napa Junction," Jones said. "They would like us to move forward with the development of a TIF district."

Jones was careful to point out this wasn't a solid commitment at the moment and that YAPG is just seeking to get the ball rolling on the process.
"I don't think that's necessarily their commit-

ment that they've chosen Napa (Junction) or Yankton County as their site," he said. "What we were hoping to do was at least get the process started with (the commission) on the development of a TIF district and a show of support that we're at least moving forward."

He added that currently the group is looking into building an industrial rail park at Napa Junction, and a Dakota Plains grain handling facility could potentially help anchor it.

'We're interested in developing a rail-industrial park in that area and Dakota Plains just happens to be the first entrance into that market," he said.

Commission chairman Todd Woods told the Press & Dakotan that the potential return of Dakota Plains is a boost to the area.

"It's exciting — we need to continue building our communities so we can keep young people in here and keep our communities growing so we can keep taxes low," he said. Jones said the TIF is being sought as a way of

helping with the costs of the site. The TIF district is important for the construc-

tion of a lot of different infrastructure out there, including roads," he said.

According to Jones, construction costs on the 193-acre plot of land including electrical, dirt work, building a rail loop and purchase of the land are

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## Lt. Gov.: SD 2nd In **US For Juvenile Lock-Ups**

South Dakota locks up more juveniles - often for minor offenses — than nearly any state in the nation, Lt. Gov. Matt Michels said Tuesday.

'We're incarcerating children at the second highest rate in the nation," he said. "I'm shocked at the number of kids we send away. And it's not because they're more violent.'

In response, the 2015 Legislature passed the Juvenile Justice Public Safety İmprovement Act. Gov. Dennis Daugaard signed the law, which goes into effect July 1. The juvenile justice package,

known as Senate Bill 73, uses a work group's recommendations and builds upon earlier reforms in the adult corrections system.

Michels, a Yankton native, described the law and its goals Tuesday at the Rotary Club meeting at Hillcrest Country

The juvenile justice reforms follow three goals: hold youth offenders more accountable, improve public safety and save money.

The reforms will hopefully reduce the number of youth offenders in Department of Corrections (DOC) custody in
