Lincoln Hilt with Nebraska Game Conservation officers and South Dakota Game Fish and Parks officers searching the river. They are using sonar and other technology to view the river with negative results thus far. They will continue the search (Wednesday) and are attempting to bring in other equipment that may assist them in the search. The search is being hampered by weather but we have aircraft available as soon as the weather clears." The *Press and Dakotan* has been unable to reach Chief Paulson for further comment.

What is known is that the search for Hilt continued throughout the day with several search boats. Search and Rescue officials continued to use sonar to try to identify anomalies in the water that could potentially be the body of the young boy, but weather conditions and water issues remain an issue for the searchers.

Water temperatures recorded at Gavins Point Dam are reported to be 49 degrees. At that temperature, dive teams are only allowed to stay in the water for 20 minutes before being forced to exit the water. In addition, visibility in the Missouri River near Yankton is less than two feet.

The releases at Gavins Point Dam were lowered for a few hours Tuesday at the request of Yankton County Emergency Management. At 3 p.m. Tuesday, the water level was visibly lower than it had been on Monday. However, as

mitment to the Department of Corrections means some kind of out-of-home placement, not for all of them but for most of them — some kind of out-of-home placement. That's an expensive thing," the governor said. During Tuesday's Rotary Club meeting, Michels said the new reforms will address a number of those issues. Juvenile offenders who qualify for the program will receive help with family, counseling and substance abuse issues without needing incarceration.

Just locking up juveniles and not offering treatment programs isn't the answer, Michels said. "The vast majority (of juvenile offenders) have chemical dependency issues, and we aren't offering diversion therapy," he said. "Is it right for them to go back (home) without the tools?"

"We want to provide support for kids but hold them accountable," he added. A community response team will include individuals from the court system, court services, the Department of Corrections and community health centers, Michels told the *Press & Dakotan*.

"We have the presumption of probation," he said. "The team will look at the crime, the social environment and the tools that are available. They will do an evaluation, and there will be a response."

Michels sees a number of common factors for any successful treatment. "They need a way to stay clean, find work, be trained and receive counseling," he said. Community service offers an option, Michels said. "This would use a citation process that would be used for petty offenses rather than have (the offenders) booked," he said.

Teen court, such as the

one offered in Yankton, can also be implemented where available, he added.

"We want something that has merit for the kids," he said. "Some won't be allowed to use this route, like if you have committed a violent crime or are in some other serious crime."

Many juvenile offenders may just need new direction in their lives through family, a mentor or counselor, Michels said.

The reforms don't use a cookie-cutter approach, recognizing the differences among various parts of the state, the lieutenant governor said. In addition, South Dakota officials have worked on jurisdictional cooperation for American Indian and out-of-state juvenile offenders.

Greek Minister: Evidence For Massive German War Reparations

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Greece's defense minister said his country's government has obtained "stunning evidence" to support its claim that German World War II reparations are worth a massive 278.7 billion euros (\$302 billion).

Panos Kammenos said Greece had obtained records held by the U.S. military that review the extent of damage to private and public property during the Nazi occupation.

"There is stunning evidence — detailing what (happened) in every village and in every town," Kammenos said in remarks made at the ministry Monday and published Tuesday.

"The evidence is so compelling that it will lead to the reopening of cases, even those that have already gone to court."

BACK TO SCHOOL

On Tuesday, students at Viborg-Hurley returned to classes after the Easter break, and administrators and teachers were forced to deal with questions they did not know the answers to.

In an interview with television station KELO, superintendent Rob Sylliaasen said the district returned to classes as normal, but the mood in the school was not normal.

"It has been a sad day for our school district as we are grieving with the family at this time," he said. "We are trying to hold on to hope and provide support to our students and staff. We make our counselors available and we can reach out to our surrounding districts and bring in additional counselors if we need to."

South Dakota, Michels said. The reforms will cost an estimated \$3.5 million, compared to the \$30 million otherwise needed to build additional juvenile facilities, he added.

"In one circuit, 65 percent of the kids sent away (to juvenile facilities) came from one judge," Michels said. "Why? Because there was no system (offering alternatives)."

That particular example wasn't the only instance where judges held few options, the lieutenant governor said. He pointed to the impact of sending young offenders far from familiar surroundings.

"In the past, a kid may use marijuana. If they're in the juvenile system, we could send them to (STAR Academy at) Custer," he said. "But Yankton to Custer is a long distance from home and you don't know anybody."

As a result, juvenile offenders find themselves without the support of family and friends, Michels said. In addition, juvenile offenders may not acquire the skills for successfully returning to their hometowns, he said.

In his State of the State address last January, Daugaard noted such incarceration may not be necessary in many cases. South Dakota's juvenile violent crime arrest rate is one-third the national average, the governor said. In 2013, seven of every 10 youth committed to the DOC were for misdemeanor offenses, probation violations and status offenses like underage drinking or truancy. "For most juveniles, com-

record of Yankton County being part of the railroad authority, per the Secretary of State's office."

She added there's nothing legally stopping the county from starting its own.

"According to the secretary of transportation, there is nothing that would prohibit multiple regional rail authorities from encompassing the same rail line or having overlapping geographical areas or regions within their boundaries," she said.

A regional rail authority in Yankton would cover rail within the county boundaries. Two governing entities would need to sign on to such a proposal and the county is looking to the Yankton City Commission, which will discuss the proposal at a later meeting.

Commission chairman Todd Woods said while the county would like to sign on with the city, they will seek alternatives if this doesn't pan out.

The process would also include a public meeting to be announced at a later date and could take up to 75 days for approval.

Bodenstedt said a rail authority would provide benefits when it comes to working on rail lines in the county.

"The formation of a regional rail authority would provide a potential alternative option for borrowing the funds through the (state) rail board for rail infrastructure

Dakota. There are some properties similar to Napa Junction, they're just not located within a population base. ... The state has had a rail repair-type company look at them, there's been steel companies, so I think there is a lot of interest in South Dakota for the development of a rail industrial park."

Jones said while there's a certain buzz about a rail park and the potential return of Dakota Plains, there's a lot of work that still needs to be done before getting the project off the ground, including the execution of a feasibility study.

"We need to determine, I think, in order to have a marketable product, what a typi-

improvements in Yankton County," she said. "That's one of the biggest advantages of the rail authority — access to capital. Most rail authorities lie dormant until financing is needed, and once that happens, the rail authority is very critical to ensuring the success of the project."

She added that this would also help with a rail park proposed by Yankton Area Progressive Growth (YAPG) at Napa Junction.

"This would be a positive thing for any prospective business that was going to look at the rail park," she said. "This is another access (point) to have funds to assist in the development of the rail area."

Woods said it's another way to move the county forward.

"It's just another tool, another building block to add some diversification and give us more to build on and go forward," he said. "There's not a cost to the county."

The commission voted unanimously to move forward on the formation of a rail authority for Yankton County.

In other business Tuesday, the Commission:

- Amended the rules to enacting a county-wide burn ban.
- Discussed efforts to create a Yankton County seal.
- Appointed Patty Varva the Yankton County Treasurer to replace outgoing Treasurer Pam Marchand, effective July 1.
