'Working Identity' Exhibition To Open

VERMILLION — In conjunction with the University of South Dakota's Biennial Women and Gender Research Conference, an exhibition entitled "Working Identity" will open at the Washington Street Art Center in Vermillion on Thursday, April 9.

The exhibition of visual art and poetry addresses the theme of gendered work, and the effects of rural life on the formation of a "working" identity for women artists and poets. The exhibition was curated by artist Susan Heggestad, and includes a diverse array of artists whose works address the multiple identities rural women artists often find themselves adopting, in order to make meaning, support themselves and their families and to seek recognition for their work. Some of these issues stem from an isolated rural environment, some from limited professional opportunities and some stem from lingering traditional attitudes common in rural communities. While some artists and their bodies of work embrace and reclaim notions of "women's work," others reflect critically on the boundaries imposed upon women artists by a rural environment.

In curating the exhibition, equal emphasis is placed on emerging as well as established regional artists, and the works will explore the above themes in relation to women's cultural, social, political and domestic lives.
