

Scotland's Bloch Signs With MMC

Shaye Bloch liked what he saw at Mount Marty College and liked what he heard from men's basketball coach Andrew Baker.

So much so that Bloch, a 6-foot-4 standout at Scotland High School, decided to continue his basketball career 33 miles away in Yankton.

"I liked the way coach Baker coaches the team and how he's going to have the team going in the right direction," Bloch said Tuesday afternoon, the same day MMC announced his

A two-time All-Conference basketball player and standout high jumper for the Scotland Highlanders, Bloch averaged 16 points, 6 rebounds and 4 assists last season as a senior.

Production like that understandably caught Mount Marty's attention, but it was more than numbers that really piqued the program's interest, according to Baker.

"Shaye is a great kid first of all with a teamoriented mentality, and that fits our culture very well," Baker said.

The chance to vault a MMC program that has won a combined six games over the last two seasons was a challenge Bloch said he

"I wanted to be part of that," he said. "I have a bunch of confidence in him (Baker) and how the team is going.'

If the Lancers are to improve next season, they will again do so with a roster dotted with South Dakota natives – there were eight in-state products on the 2014-15 roster. What there wasn't much of, however, was height.

Mount Marty boasted five players of at least 6-foot-5 last season.

It's always good to get some size, especially if they can guard," Baker said.

"He's (Bloch) big and he can continue to grow, too. He can guard multiple spots, which gives us some flexibility.

The transition from Class B to the Great Plains Athletic Conference is a jump Bloch said he's ready for, based on his two summers playing AAU ball with the Dakota Schoolers.

"I know college is a lot more up tempo, so I'll have to develop my skills more," Bloch said. "I like that style, though.'

He will walk on campus this fall, though, with skills that are already well developed,

'He's got a good skill set for his age coming in, so hopefully he'll be able to help us early in his career," Baker said.

Mount Marty has signed five recruits to this point for the 2015 class, including White River guard Justin Prue – a Class B first team All-State selection. The program hopes to add at least five more, Baker said.

Well-Rounded Stars Lead Class A All-State

ABERDEEN — They score, rebound, defend and win.

The Class A boys' basketball all-state first-team is a fine collection of seniors and juniors that not only led their teams in scoring, but in other categories as well.

The first team consists of Ty Hoglund of Dell Rapids, Brayden McNeary of Aberdeen Roncalli, Tyson Jenkins of Clark-Willow Lake, Noah Vettrus of West Central, Jacob Hinker of Lennox and Brendan Harter of

The all-state teams are chosen by the South Dakota Basketball Coaches Association and the South Dakota Sportswriters

The 6-foot-3 McNeary was instrumental in leading the Cavaliers (23-2) to their first state championship since 1975. The versatile guard averaged 17.4 points, 5.4 assists and 4.8 rebounds per game. The Northern State signee finished his career third on the state signee finished his career third in the state of the program scoring list (1,084) and is the program leader in career three-pointers (155). McNeary, who was a third team allstater last season, is only the fourth player in program history to reach the 1,000-point milestone.

McNeary is also the SDBCA Class A Player of the Year, which is awarded to the senior with the most all-state votes in each respective class.

"Brayden is a very versatile player," Aberdeen Roncalli coach Todd Neuendorf said. "We were able to play Brayden at all posi-

tions from one-through-four this season. Brayden is a scorer. He cannot only shoot it from the perimeter, but also get to the rim. His greatest attribute is his willingness to compete. He will not let others out work him. Brayden played the game as hard and as well as anyone I have ever coached. It is like having a coach on the floor. He thinks and knows the game so well."

The 6-foot-2 Hoglund guided Dell Rapids to a runner-up finish at the state tournament. The smooth southpaw recorded 19.3 points, 5.9 rebounds and 2.8 assists per contest for the 22-3 Quarriers. Hoglund, who was a second team all-stater last year as a sophomore, will begin next season with 996 career points. He's started since his fresh-

Coyotes Hope Little Things Lead To Big Success

VERMILLION - In his new role as special teams coordinator, Marquice Williams has lofty goals for the University of South Dakota football team.

He is at the same time, though, keeping things basic.

Our motto is that we want to create and control field position." Williams, also in charge of the defensive line, said after Tuesday's practice inside the DakotaDome.

"The way we do that is with

great effort." Williams, starting his fourth ason with the program, took over special teams duties from Tim Triplett who left last month

for St. Thomas (Minnesota). Improving their protection and production on special teams – which would therefore help both the offense and defense – was a key focus over the off-season for the Coyotes. And

for good reason. Last season, USD ranked last in the Missouri Valley Football Conference in scoring offense (19.4) and scoring defense

(35.6), as well as last in punt return average (4.5) and ninth in kickoff return average (17.5).

"This year, I think it's going to be a whole different ballgame, and I think special teams could be one of our stronger points," said redshirt freshman defensive back Alex Coker.

"We have a lot of guys out here competing for spots they didn't think they would get."

Five practices through the 14-practice spring season, the Coyotes still haven't put together an 11 on 11 for special teams. And that's by design, Williams said.

No, instead, he wanted every ea of the team to work on things like blocking, coverage, tackling and getting off blocks.

"Doing all that, we're putting all the pieces together," Williams said. "I have the puzzle, but the guys don't see the final product

"If we're able to do techniques within the schematics then it doesn't matter what guy we throw out there.'

That's another change under the Williams regime: More guvs will be involved in the 'core

four' areas of punt, punt return, kickoff and kickoff return. "I can't expect receivers or

tight ends to run around and be big contributors on special teams if we're not implementing it in practice and teaching them," Williams said.

The goal is simple, he added: Get the best 11 guys on the field, regardless of who they are.

They want to be in a position to not want to take you off the field, because you're making plays," said senior Adam Juhl, a Sioux Falls native.

By involving everyone from senior on down to redshirt freshmen (and possibly true freshmen this fall). Williams' effort also sparks competition.

"It really pushes you to dig deep and find that extra gear you didn't think you had," Juhl said. "If you're not up there on offense or defense, you can be on special teams and you can ball out on special teams."

Depending on injuries, the Coyotes had a pretty good idea a year ago who would be contributing on special teams. Now, as Coker pointed out, anyone could be pointed to for help.

"With coach Williams, he's going to play the best players on the field," Coker said. "That's the beauty of it. If you come out here and give it your all, he's going to notice it and put you in

And in a spot to lessen the stress on the defense or set the offense up in a better spot.

'It puts you in a better position on offense and defense, because if you come out there and pin them back, it makes it easier on the defense," Juhl said. "Or if you get a big return, the offense can start racking up points.

"The energy out here is going to be wild and we'll start getting those (wins).

Over the past three years, the Coyotes have seen first-hand in the Missouri Valley the fine line between winning and losing, and it usually involves one play.

"It's not really the schemes, it's guys giving great effort and using their techniques," Williams said. "If we can be consistent with those things, we'll be
