the township's roadways. "Because of that extended period of time, the roads have become in such poor

condition that we need gravel really bad," he said. There are roads that are down to their clay base or dirt base and there's virtually no gravel on them."

The opt-out is for \$45,000 each year over the next three vears. The Utica Township also has another \$45,000 opt-out that is set to expire this year and a permanent opt-out for \$15,000 that was grandfathered in before July 1. 2002.

Cap said the opt-out is somewhat flexible, depending on the need over the next few years

"The nice thing about this opt-out is, if we should not need the whole \$45,000 each year, we can decided to only take out \$30,000 or \$20,000 or whatever that amount might be," he said. "That will be decided at the beginning of each year.

any resistance so far for the proposed opt-out and there was no resistance for the current opt-out that will be expiring at the end of this year just because the residents who travel the gravel roads know what poor shape they're in," he said. "They know that they need some gravel really bad because they know they've deteriorated over the years because there wasn't enough money available from the tax revenues in order for us to do a little bit of gravel every year. Now it's hitting us all of a sudden where we've got to do something and we've got to do it in some larger amounts. Once we get everything covered, it should take us a little ways.'


