University's Veterinary Diagnostic Lab said samples from the flock of 40,000 turkeys in Dickey County tested positive for H5 avian influenza after the owner reported an increase in death rates.

State officials are waiting to get confirmation from the National Veterinary Services Laboratories in Ames, Iowa, on the exact strain of avian influenza. If confirmed, it would be the first case in a commercial operation in North Dakota.

The cases were the latest in a growing outbreak of bird flu, especially the highly contagious H5N2 strain affecting poultry in multiple states, including nearby Minnesota. The federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention considers the risk to people to be low.

So far the total number of outbreaks across the Midwest has reached at least 15, including the new finding in South Dakota. Minnesota has been hit the hardest with nine farms struck by the virus. The disease has killed or forced producers to destroy well over 500,000 birds since early March.

"We do anticipate that we could find additional cases, additional farms infected with highly pathogenic avian influenza," said Dr. Dustin Oedekoven, the South Dakota state veterinarian.

The first case of the virus in South Dakota was found last week at farm run by a Hutterite colony near Huron in Beadle County.

South Dakota officials on Thursday said they had quarantined the latest farm and that birds on the property would be killed to prevent the spread of the disease.

Oedekoven said all turkeys at the Beadle County farm had been destroyed and that disposal is underway. He said the Kingsbury County farm would begin destroying birds Thursday and hoped they would be done on Friday.

Oedekoven said the state disposes of the carcasses by either burying or composting them.

As a precaution, the state plans to quarantine and test all poultry in a 10-kilometer zone surrounding the latest farm, Oedekoven said. They also plan to do some surveillance in a 20-kilometer zone.

Arkansas River and Missouri River.

"It's amazing how quickly they have moved across the United States," he said.

Smith described the presence of the quagga mussel in the Angostura Reservoir of western South Dakota as well as the zebra mussel at Lewis and Clark Lake. With a graphic, he illustrated how rapidly the two mussels could overtake nearly all of South Dakota.

The AIS have gained regional and national attention, Smith said, noting 19

They also plan to utilize two aircraft and three dive teams in the search this weekend, as well as a specialized underwater camera.

According to Paulsen, a number of resources and search methods have been employed along the river.

"(Rescuers) have searched with side-view sonar," he said. "They have visually searched the waters. We have dropped a 35-pound weight with a buoy from that dock ... and it's drifted to the same location both times. We will continue to monitor the river flow, but in following that buoy, we have not located him where it finally gets caught up in the debris."

Divers have also searched the backflow underneath the dock twice with no results.

Paulsen characterized the operation as a recovery at this point.

Western states have enacted a protocol for fighting invasive species with the goal of de-listing a species.

Smith discussed GF&P's latest public awareness campaign entitled "#SDLeast-Wanted." He outlined the use of educational outlets such as billboards, outreach events, the South Dakota State Fair in Huron, the Missouri River Watershed School Festival at Yankton and social media.

The stakes are high when it comes to invasive species, Smith said, as prevention remains far preferable to fighting the invaders once they take root in an environment.

To illustrate, Smith estimated it would cost

Paulsen said contact was made Sunday night with Lincoln's biological father John Hilt, who was recently released from prison, and is now living in Wisconsin. Initially, the county took charge of the incident with the police department working behind the scenes to, among other things, ascertain the Hilt's whereabouts. Authorities in Wisconsin established Hilt had not left home.

Paulsen said foul play is not suspected.

He asked that if anyone were to see Lincoln, to call the Yankton Police Department, but they aren't looking for volunteers to aid in the search.

"Even professionals have trouble with that recovery — that's why I hope they'll contact us if they think that they have something," he said.
