2015 and 2016.

DOT area engineer Ron Peterson of the Yankton office said the project remains on the state plan. However, Thursday's decision will affect the timing.

"This will remain on the STIP plan. It's not taken off, it's just delayed," he said. "We're looking at about a year's delay if we let (bids) in the fall. The contract will flow the workload into the next season."

Yankton city manager Amy Nelson said the reconstruction project will still become reality.

"We're going to do the project," she said. "It's a matter of the timing and how it's going to come together that remains to be determined. The DOT made its decision, and now we're moving ahead from there."

Nelson said she had already been holding discussions Thursday with state and local DOT staff. She anticipates further meetings between state and city officials on how to proceed with the project.

When it comes to the Highway 50 project, the DOT could pursue a number of scenarios, Peterson said. "It's a combination of things, where they could delay the project, re-let the bid or change the specs," he said.

State officials could also decide to change their approach to the project, Peterson said. "They could break it into two projects or combine it with the one to the east. Those are other options," he said.

DOT officials at both the state and local levels will look at alternatives, Peterson said. "Over the next several months, we have a team that will look at it. We will see what the best solution for next fall," he said. "They are looking for ways to make the project more productive and more effective in order to make that bid better."

The Highway 50 reconstruction project could still see some progress this year, Peterson said. "There is another project coming east of Yankton for concrete overlay. We could do something to make (the Highway 50 work) part of that project," he said.

Peterson was traveling for work Thursday and didn't know the exact reason why the DOT rejected the bids. However, he anticipates cost played a major factor. "On both (bids), they came in significantly higher than the engineers had considered," he said.

In that case, Peterson said it's not unusual for the DOT to reject too high or when only one bidder steps forward.

The Highway 50 project may have drawn just one bidder because of the timing and location, Peterson said. "There are very few urban

paving contractors in this corner of the state. Maybe most of them have filled their season and aren't available," he said.

Nelson said she didn't participate in Thursday's DOT conference call, but she shares some of Peterson's observations.

"I didn't hear the reason why the bid was rejected. I presume it was cost and the fact they didn't have another bid," she said. "It's hard, when you don't have another bid to compare it with, especially when the bid comes in much higher than the estimate."

While disappointed the Highway 50 project faces a delay, Nelson said she also understands the DOT decision from a funding perspective.

"From my perspective, we always have to keep in mind the state and city need to be good stewards, as good as we can be, with the financial resources," she said. "As a city, we also want to do the best project we can for the most economical way we can."

Meanwhile, Yankton city officials will reconfigure street work this summer in light of the Highway 50 delay, Nelson said.

"Because we anticipated the Highway 50 project, we have avoided some of our other local street projects geographically. Now, we can move things around a little bit," she said. "We're going to need to make some changes to the budget and what we plan for construction this year, especially with construction season upon us. We will be looking to do the best we can for street projects at the relatively same cost (that we had planned)."

Nelson said she appreciates what she considers an outstanding working relationship and communication between the City of Yankton and the DOT officials at both the state and local level. In particular, she noted Peterson's contributions as a liaison.

"The DOT has been really great about discussing with me our thoughts and some of our concerns and considerations between the time when the bid was opened and today," she said. "I think they'll continue to communicate well with us."

The DOT Transportation Commission holds its next meeting April 23. Nelson isn't sure what, if any, discussion the Highway 50 reconstruction project may receive at the time.

However, Yankton city officials remain committed to seeing the project become reality, she said.

"Down the line, we may have recommendations on how this (project) can fall into place," she said. "In the meantime, we'll just keep going."
