Commuters Head Home Amid Light Snow

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Commuters were greeted with light snowfall Thursday as they headed home from work in Omaha. The National Weather Service says snow was expected to fall until about 6:30 p.m. in Omaha. Norfolk also saw light accumulation, and David City got 1.4 inches of snow.

Meteorologist Becky Kern tells the *Omaha World-Herald* that the snow wasn't sticking to the ground, but it might create some slush. She says a warm front following the snow will bring more spring-like temperatures.

Hundreds Mourn Jandreau's Death

LOWER BRULE (AP) — Hundreds of mourners, representatives from South Dakota's tribal governments and state and federal leaders gathered Thursday to remember late Lower Brule Sioux Tribal Chairman Michael Jandreau, who was considered an icon in Indian Country.

Leaders from other Native American tribes from South Dakota and neighboring states paid respects to Jandreau and told stories to a packed gymnasium of funeral-goers at the Lower Brule Community Center. The 71-year-old Jandreau died on April 3 from heart problems at a Sioux Falls hospital after serving as a leader in the tribe for more than 35 years.

Former Mandan, Hidatsa and Arikara Nation Chairman Tex Hall was one of many leaders who noted Jandreau's long tenure at the helm of tribal government on the Lower Brule Indian

Reservation along the Missouri River.
"I always knew him as chairman," Hall said. "He was devoted to the Lower Brule people."

Jandreau was elected to the Lower Brule Tribal Council in the early 1970s and later became chairman. He earned praise from tribal members and state and federal leaders for economic development projects that benefited the 1,300 Native Americans on the reservation.

Education Grant Compromise Advances

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Lawmakers reached a compromise Thursday over how to split millions of dollars in Nebraska Lottery money for education grants and programs.

Senators advanced a new funding distribution bill with a 34-0, first-round vote, after changing the original measure to ensure K-12 schools receive a larger percentage of the money.

The largest recipient under the bill is the Nebraska Opportunity Grant program, which provides financial aid to lowincome college students. K-12 schools would receive millions for "innovation grants."

Lottery revenue varies by year, depending on ticket sales. Nebraska will have an estimated \$27.7 million available in fiscal 2017 and \$17.8 million the following year.

Sen. Kate Sullivan of Cedar Rapids, chairwoman of the Education Committee, said lawmakers plan to conduct an interim study this year into college affordability.

We will be looking at that and quite conceivably come up with some additional ideas that may be proposed next session on how we support needy students who want to pursue a higher education," she said.

The bill would distribute 62 percent of the money to Nebraska Opportunity Grants for low-income college students; 20 percent for K-12 "innovation grants" to encourage new approaches to education; 9 percent for financial aid to community college students specializing in areas where Nebraska faces a labor shortage; 8 percent for forgivable loans to teachers who receive training in specialties that are needed; and 1 percent for extended-learning programs for high-need students.

AP Analysis: Few Vets Wait More Than 30 Days For Appointment

SIOUX FALLS — Relatively few veterans in South Dakota had to wait more than 30 days for an appointment at a Veterans Affairs medical center or clinic, according to an analysis of the most recent government data.

The Associated Press examined waiting times at 940 VA hospitals and outpatient clinics from Sept. 1 to Feb. 28 to see how things might have improved since a scandal over delays and attempts to cover them up led to the resignation of the agency's secretary and prompted lawmakers in August to pass the Veterans Access, Choice and Accountability

The AP's analysis found that, nationally, 2.8 percent of all appointments handled by the health system failed to meet the federal timeliness goal, which calls for patients to be seen within 30 days. The majority of South Dakota's VA locations fared better than the national average, less than 1.5 percent, though three fell just short: Fort Meade at 3.6 percent, Rapid City at 3 percent and Sioux Falls at 2.9 percent, according to

"Our veterans are getting the care

they need. And if they're waiting, it's often something we're doing to support their choice of when they get their health care and where they get their health care," said Darwin Goodspeed, a Navy veteran who now leads the Sioux Falls VA system. He cited possible examples, such as snowbirds who won't see their VA doctor until returning from warmer climates or veterans in rural areas scheduling numerous appointments for one trip to a VA site.

"A fairly large majority of them have agreed to stay on that waiting list because they want to wait for a VA doctor. They don't want to go a civilian doctor. They're willing to wait," added Ken Laughlin, adjutant executive director of the Disabled American Veterans for

One potential change that could alter some wait times in western South Dakota is the proposed closure of the inpatient hospital at Hot Springs, which would shift some services to Rapid City,

But VA Black Hills Health Care System acting director Jo-Ann Ginsberg said that wouldn't be the case because a new outpatient clinic would be built in Hot Springs to handle all other services, she

"Rather than be housed in an outpatient part of our hospital, they'd be housed in an outpatient clinic," Ginsberg

Sloan Gibson, deputy secretary of the VA, said that when he looked at the Hot Spring hospital's data a few months ago, just five patients, on average, were spending the night.

That illustrates some of the unique challenges the VA faces when it comes to allocating resources and dealing with patient access, he said. Only the VA would continue to operate a full-service hospital in an area with so little demand for inpatient services, Sloan said, adding that the Black Hills hospital staff had done a good job ensuring quality care.

"Go find a private sector hospital" operating with just five patients per night, he said. "In fact, you won't find them."

While the overall number of South Dakota appointments with a wait time of 61 days or more was relatively low, it was higher in January and February at the Fort Meade hospital, which Ginsberg attributed to various factors, such as post-holiday scheduling, snowbirds scheduling for their return and some farmers taking advantage of the slower

Gay Teacher Is Fired From Catholic School

OMAHA, Neb. — Supporters of a teacher whose Omaha Catholic school contract will not be renewed because of his same-sex relationship say the school is discriminating against him based on his

But experts say the school has not violated Omaha's 3-year-old anti-bias ordinance protecting gay and transgender people because the ordinance has a religious exception, and a lawsuit would probably not succeed.

Skutt Catholic High School rescinded its offer to renew the contract Matt Eledge, an

English teacher and speech team coach, after learning he planned to marry his same-sex partner, saying that would violate church tenet in breach of his contract, according to Kacie Hughes, a close friend of Eledge's and assistant Skutt speech coach. The school later said he could return to the school but only if he ended his same

sex relationship. Eledge, 28, confirmed that his contract at Skutt has not been renewed. He's taught at the school since 2010, and the speech team he coaches just won its fourth straight

state championship. "Whatever happens, I love Nebraska and I love my job.

I love working here," he said.

"I want to do the right thing, but I don't want to say anything that would hurt my job or anybody I care about. I'm scared and unsure and fearful. I'm just trying to finish out the year at this point."

Hughes, a 2012 graduate of Skutt, said Eledge was told by his bosses that if he told his students he was gay, "he'd be fired on the spot," she said.

"Catholic schools in general allow teachers to be divorced without an annulment, or let teachers be on the pill or let men get a vasectomy ... there are so many examples,' Hughes said. "You don't do this to anyone else except for him, because he's gay."
