Entrepreneurs Sought For 2015 Accelerator Challenge

ST. LOUIS — A proven program for fast-tracking company start-ups and entrepreneurial launches is seeking its next group of business ideas. Through April 20, the South Dakota Technology Business Center (SDTBC) is accepting applications for the 2015 Accelerator Challenge. The program is sponsored by SDTBC with Forward Sioux Falls, the Governor's Office of Economic Development, the US Small Business Administration and South Dakota EPSCoR. "The Accelerator Challenge is designed to boost emerging South Dakota entrepreneurs who are starting up, approaching launch or entering a high growth stage," said Pam Boehm, SDTBC Entrepreneurship and Incubation Manager. "The program focuses on essential business principles and gives participants a wide range of resources, funding, networking opportunities and strategic guidance to help them get their businesses growing fast." The 2015 Challenge kicks off with a three-day Business Launch Boot Camp beginning on May 20, followed by monthly one-day sessions from June through September. The program culminates with a "Pitch Day" where participants have an opportunity to present their business plans to representatives from four angel funds. Throughout the

program, participants are also eligible to "pitch" their ideas for project funding from a pool of \$50,000 and take advantage of no-cost or low-cost space at SDTBC. In addition, all participant businesses will be showcased during the 2015 Innovation Expo on Oct. 1. The Business Launch Boot Camp and Accelerator Challenge were initiated in 2012. Since the program was introduced, 20 participants have accepted the challenge, 15 of which have grown their businesses to employ a total of 60 people and have raised more than \$2.5 million in investment dollars. In a few cases, participants have determined their ideas were not viable, which can also be a valuable benefit of participation. "The Accelerator Challenge is all about preparing the next generation of great business innovators and giving them the tools they need to succeed," Boehm said. "The program offers essential business training and strategic guidance related to all aspects of operations at critical business development stages—which can rapidly bring a new company into the marketplace." Entrepreneurs and individuals planning start-ups or developers of emerging businesses are encouraged to submit applications outlining their business concepts. Businesses or business

ideas will be evaluated for viability and ability to fill a market need, scalability, readiness to launch and likelihood for operational success. Finalists will then be selected for personal interviews. The entrepreneur's or business team's relevant experience, skills, leadership ability, willingness to learn and overall passion, motivation and commitment to drive the business forward will also be considered. Up to 10 qualified participants will be selected. Applications and guidelines are available at www.sdtbc.com/accelerator and will be accepted through 11:59 p.m., Monday, April 20. There are no program entry fees or expenses, however participants are responsible for their own travel and lodging if coming from outside Sioux Falls. This year's Accelerator Challenge participants will be announced on May 5. "It's an exciting program, and a very intense, concentrated program designed to make a difference in the potential for new businesses," added Dr. Mel Ustad, Director of Commercialization for the Governor's Office of Economic Development. "The Accelerator Challenge has also proven successful in preparing South Dakota entrepreneurs to help build our state's economy."

"Everybody who comes before you asking for a tax break has a terrific argument for it — or at least they think so," Schumacher said. "After you gain a little experience, you realize that almost every one of them is a slippery slope." Some tax breaks may serve a worthwhile purpose, but those that are already in place need to be scrutinized, said Renee Fry, executive director of the OpenSky Policy Institute, a Nebraska think tank. Fry said the state is wise to offer sales tax exemptions for business inputs, such as wood and metal used to

build chairs, because taxing each component separately increases the end-cost for consumers. But once enacted, Fry said tax exemptions are harder to track than regular government spending. Expenses included in the state budget are reviewed regularly by lawmakers and the governor and must be defended in public hearings. In an era of term limits, Fry said the tax exemptions are approved and easily forgotten. "The more we exempt, the more we narrow our tax base," Fry said. "What we don't know is whether what we're exempting provides a good return on the investment." Past attempts to expand the sales tax base have failed. Former Gov. Dave

Heineman ran into heavy opposition in 2013 when he called on lawmakers to eliminate sales tax exemptions to pay for proposed income tax cuts. He ended up scrapping the plan. Nebraska allows sales tax exemptions on 98 different goods and services, from farm chemicals to airplane fuel to bull semen, according to the Department of Revenue. Sen. Al Davis of Hyannis said property tax exemptions are partly to blame for funding problems in Nebraska's K-12 schools. Each property tax exemption reduces the revenue that

school districts can generate locally, which forces the state to make up the difference with an already stretched K-12 equalization budget. Davis said state officials have no idea how much property isn't taxed, which makes it harder to pass broad-based tax relief. He introduced a bill this year that would have required counties to compile a list of all tax-exempt property and its value, but the measure stalled in committee.
