VanDenBerg flew 37 feet, 6 ¾ inches to win the triple jump. Her mark of 17-3 ¼ in the long jump was good enough for

Tyler Payer (Armour) placed sixth in the high jump (6-1 1/4), Adam Haigh (Bloomfield, Nebraska) placed sixth in the pole vault (13-3 ½) and Neil Hohenthaner (Yankton) finished sixth in the decathlon (4,559), including a first-place mark in the 1,500-meter run (4:55.12).

After dropping the first game 4-3 in eight innings, the Lancers bounced back with a 5-0 victory in game two.

"For the most part I thought we played pretty well today," said Lancer head coach Albert Fernandez. "We did a good iob of staying positive and responding to adversity.'

With gusts of wind reaching 35 miles per hour blowing out to right field, the weather played a big role in both teams offensive production.

Nebraska Wesleyan opened up the offense early in game one after a two run home run by Rachel Kubik. The Prairie Wolves added another run in the sixth inning to take a 3-0

"Winning or losing a game never comes down to just one play," said Fernandez. "There were a number of deferent plays throughout the entire game that had an effect on the outcome.

In game two, the Lancers were the first to strike scoring two runs in the game's opening

Lancer pitcher Katie Groteluschen did not need much run support. Groteluschen, who threw a complete game in a 7-1 victory over Dakota Wesleyan

just five hits. "Katie threw an excellent game for us," said Fernandez. We got our offense going and we were making plays defensively.

With one swing of the bat, Jenn Mitera added a few insurance runs for the Lancers in the fifth with a two-run home run. The home run was Mitera's second of the season.

'I was proud of the way our kids bounced back," said Fernandez. "We have a few things to work on but we are staying positive and looking forward to what lies ahead.'
