The stock market closed slightly lower in light Monday trading as investors looked ahead to a busy week for company earnings. JP-Morgan Chase, Johnson & Johnson, and Wells Fargo are among the big names turning in quarterly results Tuesday as earnings season gets underway.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 80.61 points, or 0.5 percent, to close at 17,977.04.

The Standard & Poor’s 500 index slipped 9.63 points, or 0.5 percent, to 2,092.43.

The Nasdaq lost 7.73 points, or 0.2 percent, to 4,988.25.

The Dow is up 153.97 points, or 0.9 percent.
The S&P 500 index is up 33.53 points, or 1.6 percent.
The Nasdaq is up 252.19 points, or 5.3 percent.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were lower Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for July delivery fell 23.75 cents to \$5.0025 a bushel; July corn lost 6.75 cents to 3.78 a bushel; July oats were off a penny to 2.6750 a bushel; while July soybeans declined 3.25 cents to \$9.5275 a bushel.

Beef was higher and pork mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. June live cattle rose .15 cent to \$1.4895 a pound; August feeder cattle was up .35 cent to \$2.1180 a pound; while June lean hogs were .62 cents higher at \$7.877 a pound.

This fun and educational event is Saturday, April 25, from 9 a.m.-3 p.m., with early plant sales Friday, April 24, from 6-8 p.m. The event is held at the Northeast Community College, Chuck Pohlman Ag Complex, 2301 E. Benjamin Ave, Norfolk.

Nearly 30 vendors have registered to attend. In addition to nursery and garden décor supplies other items available will be jewelry, kitchen tools, skin care, crafts, quilts, collectables, candles, toys, home décor and gourmet food.
