## **Parkston's Bormann Earns Title At Yankton Invite** Golf: O'Gorman Takes Team Honors; Gazelles Finish Sixth

Parkston junior Sydney Bormann double-bogeyed the first hole of the day. The rest of field might have been happier had her bad start continued a little longer.

Bormann, the defending Class A individual champion, shot a 2-under 71 to easily outdistance the field for individual honors at the Yankton Invitational girls' golf tournament, held on Friday at Yankton's Hillcrest Golf and Country Club.

Perennial power Sioux Falls O'Gorman, the defending Class AA champions, claimed team honors with a score of 329, 14 strokes better than Parkston, the three-time defending Class A champs. Rapid City Stevens (344) and Pierre (345) followed closely in third and fourth.

Bormann, a two-time Class wouldn't have given us a A champion, was happy with her round. She finished six strokes up on Pierre's Karissa Guthrie and seven up on O'Gorman's Elle Carlson, the defending Class AA cham-

pion. "It felt like everything came together," she said. "I had a rough start, but I had to stay with it.

Bormann was also happy to see her Trojans be right in the mix with the top teams in South Dakota's big-school ranks.

"Going into today, we knew we could compete," she said. "I am lucky to be a part of a program that is able to compete against the bigger schools.'

O'Gorman put four golfers in the top 15 on the way to the title, an outcome coach Rod Garrison was not confident in at the midway point. "After the first nine I

chance," he said. "But they all came back on the second nine.

One factor Garrison feels plays in the Knights' favor is their experience. "Five or our girls came

back from last year," he said. "That's a major thing to have when you are developing a golf team."

Garrison, who along with longtime Stevens head coach Phil Hunt coached his last Yankton Invitational on Friday, said that, weather-wise, they might have saved the best for last.

This was a beautiful day, one of the best days we've had for the Yankton Invite," he said. "It wasn't a blizzard, or raining, or blowing like crazy. It was a super day on a super golf course.'

While clouds hung around the entire day, nothing came out of them despite forecasts

that predicted rain. "We got very lucky," said Yankton head coach Brett Sime. "Last year we were delayed because it was too cold. This year I watched the forecast, and there was a good chance for rain. When woke up, that chance had been pushed back a bit and, by the time I got to the golf course, it had been pushed all the way to 9 p.m.

"It was a perfect day, and we did see some great scores because of it."

One of those scores was Yankton junior Becky Frick. Frick, still sporting a walking boot from a basketball injury in February, played her second competitive round of the season and shot a 12-over 85 to get into the top 15. Frick shot a 12-over 84 to win a triangular at Fox Run on Tuesday.
