Bucks Split With Woodbury County

The Yankton Bucks split with Woodbury County in club high school baseball action on Sunday at Yankton's Bob Tereshinski Stadium at Riverside Field.

In the opener, Yankton rallied from an early deficit to claim a 7-4 victory.

Jordan Kathol had two hits, two RBI and a run scored to lead a balanced Yankton attack. Colin Muth had a double, two RBI and a run scored. Mason Townsend had a double, RBI and run scored. Sheldon Gant had a double and a RBI. Tyler Guthmiller, Austin Johnson and Ben Cameron also had hits, with Guthmiller scoring twice, Johnson scoring once and Cameron driving in a run.

Johnson struck out five batters over four innings for the win. Hunter Cameron earned the save, striking out two.

In the nightcap, Woodbury County blanked the Bucks 8-0. Brad Ulmer, Adam Walter and Guthmiller had hits.

Ben Cameron took the loss, with Kathol pitching three innings of relief.

Yankton travels to Sioux Falls on Tuesday, facing O'Gorman in varsity and JV action. Play begins with the varsity game at 5:30 p.m.

In JV action, Yankton and Woodbury County also split. Just as happened with the varsity teams, Yankton won the opener and Woodbury County won the nightcap.

Yankton won the opener 7-5.

Justin Leader had two hits and two runs scored, and Adam Heine had two hits and a RBI to lead Yankton. Devin Cook had a double and three RBI, and Kade Larson doubled in the win.

Chase Vogt picked up the win. Leader tossed the final three innings for the save.

Woodbury County won the nightcap 11-6. For Yankton, Adam Heine had three hits and a run scored, and Justin Leader had a double, a RBI and a run scored to lead the way. Michael Heine had a hit, a RBI and a run scored. Devin Cook and Mason Langland added hits for the Bucks.

Cavaliers Clip Celtics In NBA Playoff Opener

CLEVELAND (AP) — Kyrie Irving scored 30 points in his playoff debut, LeBron James added 20 in his first postseason game with Cleveland in five years and the Cavaliers opened a run toward an NBA title with a 113-100 victory over the Boston Celtics on Sunday.

Irving made five 3-pointers and Kevin Love, another postseason rookie, had 19 points and 12 rebounds.

It was Cleveland's first home playoff game since May 11, 2010, when the Celtics won Game 5 and James left the floor to some boos from Cavaliers fans. He departed for Miami two months later, but he's home now, all is forgiven and Cleveland is aiming to end a championship drought dating to 1964.

Isaiah Thomas scored 22 points to lead the seventh-seeded Celtics. They will try to even the best-of-7 series in Game 2 on Tuesday night.

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USD, MMC Shine At Sioux City Relays

SIOUX CITY, Iowa — The South Dakota steeplechase duo of senior Emily Feyereisen and sophomore Lottie Grimshaw set new career bests on the final day of competition at the Sioux City Relays.

Feyereisen improved by 21 seconds when she finished in 11 minutes, 48.15 seconds for third place. The time moves her into ninth in Summit League standings for the 3,000-meter steeplechase. Grimshaw also set a new best when she crossed the line in 12:05.59 for fifth place.

The Coyotes also advanced four athletes to the finals from Friday's preliminaries in the sprints.

Freshman Gawain Williams finished runner-up in the 100-meter dash after clocking 10.67 seconds, dropping .07 seconds from his preliminary time. Sophomore teammate Jack Thony placed fourth with a time of 10.89 seconds.

Sophomore Hank Lentsch

recorded a time of 15.60 seconds in the 110 hurdles to finish in fourth place.

To round out the Coyote performers, senior Molly Ervin added a seventh-place finish in the 100 hurdles finals when she ran 15.36 seconds.

Mount Marty College had two earn top-eight finishes in the women's long jump on Saturday, Holly Hegge (Crofton, Nebraska) in seventh (16-9 3/4) and Abby Vandenberg in eighth (16-4 1/2). Also on Saturday, Allison Cross finished sixth in the shot put with a toss of 41-11 1/2.

On Friday, USD placed 10 athletes in the top-five, led by sophomore Kate Kaster's victory in the 10,000-meter run.

Kaster edged out the runner-up by two seconds to secure the win with a time of 38 minutes, 50.37

Perkins Falls Just Short

Archer Misses \$1M Payday By One Shot

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Chris Perkins maintained he wasn't nervous as he chased archery history.

All he needed to do was record another perfect round Sunday and he would leave Yankton with the sport's first-ever \$1 million prize.

"If you get yourself thinking a little bit too much in this game, it really takes a toll on you," Perkins said after his round Sunday at the First Dakota Classic, a weekend tournament held at the Easton Yankton Archery Complex.

"I just tried to keep calm and cool and stuck with my shots."

Ultimately, the 22-year-old Ontario, Canada, resident — who said later he thinks archery is 90 percent mental — came up one shot short of the \$1 million.

Perkins narrowly missed on his first arrow at 60 yards Sunday, ending his bid for archery immortality. He still captured the First Dakota Classic championship male title, recording a 2-day score of 1199 out of a possible 1200.

"I scored one round at home before I left, so to come here and shoot clean (Saturday) and only one down today, you know what, I'll take it," Perkins said.

Coming into the weekend, there were seven archers eligible for the \$1 million prize, open to any pro who records a perfect score — "clean," in archery lingo — at all three legs of the 3 Star Tour (Las Vegas, Kentucky and Yankton).

Perkins was the only archer to shoot a perfect 600 on Saturday, which meant Sunday afternoon's line would be closely followed. A national archery website

30K Runners, 28,200 Bananas: Boston Marathon By The Numbers

BOSTON (AP) — The Boston Marathon includes 26.2 miles, 34 elite athletes, 30,000 runners, 87 countries, 1 million spectators and \$830,500 in prize money.

Oh, and 150 pounds of petroleum jelly, 992 portable toilets,

108,000 safety pins, 28,200 bananas, 33,984 fruit cups, 35,000 gallons of water and 1.4 million paper cups.

Here's a by-the-numbers look at Monday's 119th running of the Boston Marathon:

THE COURSE

The route covers 26 miles, 385 yards, starting on Main

Street in Hopkinton and finishing on Boylston Street in downtown Boston. In between, it winds through six other cities and towns: Ashland, Framingham, Natick, Wellesley, Newton and Brookline. Despite the challenge posed by the notorious Newton hills — best known by the final rise, Heartbreak Hill, at roughly

the 20.5 mile mark — it's a net downhill course. It's nowhere near easy. But because there's a total drop in elevation of 459 feet from start to finish, and it's a point-to-point route rather than a loop that would even out the effects of any tail wind,

MITCHELL — The Yankton track and field team claimed a dozen titles, and athletes from Ethan-Parkston and Platte-Geddes earned three titles each at the Corn Palace Relays on Saturday at Joe Quintal Field.

For the Yankton Bucks, Charlie Stephenson swept the 110- (16.31) and 300-meter (42.82) hurdle races to lead the way. Lee Rose won the long jump (21-2) and finished second (23.48) to teammate Ryan Sternhagen (23.22) in the 200. The Bucks also won the 400 (44.84) and 800 (1:32.36) relays.

Also for the Bucks, Chris Kinsley posted three top-three finishes: second in the triple jump (39-7) and third in both the long jump (19-6 1/2) and high jump (5-8).

Girls Win Three Events At SC Relays

Matt Fitzgerald was second in the high jump (5-8) and fifth in the triple jump (36-2). Nick Raab was second in the shot put (47-2) and fifth in the discus (131-4 1/2). Evan Greeneway was third in the shot put (43-8), Mason Strahl was fourth in the 400 (54.00) and Gabe Dannenbring was fifth in the 800 (2:16.67). The Bucks also finished third in the 1600 relay (3:44.60) and fifth in the medley (4:01.04).

The Platte-Geddes boys earned two titles, Carter Dykstra in the long jump (20-10 1/2) and the 1600 relay (3:40.80). Ethan-Parkston's Camden Myers won the high jump (6-0).

Four different Gazelles won individual titles, with two others sharing another title.

Emma Stewart and Lindsey Hale shared the long jump title, each clearing 15-4. Stewart also finished second in the triple jump (32-9) and third in the high jump (4-8). Hale also placed sixth in the triple jump (31-5 1/2).

Madison McClure won the 1600 (5:32.06) and finished second (11:42.22) to teammate Savannah Woods (11:37.09) in the 3200. Kate Budig won the high jump (5-4) and placed fourth in the 100 hurdles (17.21). Madason Tessier won the 100 hurdles (15.73) and placed third in the 300 hurdles (51.58). The Gazelles also won the 800 relay (1:48.77).

Also for the Gazelles, Adrienne Kusek placed second in the shot put (37-5) and fourth in the discus (97-8). Erica

Westerman was second in the 800 (2:29.81), with Tessa Folkers fourth (2:33.54). Emily Oswald placed third in the triple jump (31-9 1/2) and fifth in the long jump (14-9). Lauren Eidsness was fourth in the 1600 (5:40.86). Emerson McClure was fourth in the 3200 (13:27.36). Kaitlin Guthmiller placed fifth in the pole vault (7-6). Josie Saylor placed sixth in the discus (85-6). Sophie Bisgard placed sixth in the long jump (14-1). Mimi Garcia was fifth in the 200 (29.86).

The Gazelles also finished fifth in the 1600 (4:24.56) and 3200 (10:42.75) relays, and fourth in the medley (4:41.24).
