## **Man Gets Jail For Beatings**

MCCOOK, Neb. (AP) — A 35-year-old southwest Nebraska man convicted of beating his 13-year-old daughters has been given 45 days in jail, probation and ordered to take anger management classes.

The McCook Daily Gazette reports that James Geihsler, of rural McCook, was sentenced earlier this month. Geihsler had pleaded no contest and was convicted of felony intentional child abuse without injury and misdemeanor negligent child abuse

without injury. Prosecutors had lowered one of the charges and dropped a misdemeanor charge of domestic assault in return for Geihsler's pleas. The charges were filed after

Trask, a school board member from Wall, holds the seat for the small schools' board of education representa-

Five candidates were nominated. They are Gary Darrow of Edgemont, Mike Olson of Bennett County, Monte Wagner of Platte-Geddes, David Planteen of Langford Area and Bryan Skinner of West Central.

The voting deadline is Friday, May 29. A run-off would be held immediately between the top two vote-getters if one or both of the director elections don't finish in a firstballot majority.

'The fact of the matter is, Platte-Napa is a regional rail authority now, and Yankton County is a part of that," Moore said. "The problem you're going to have is superimposing over the top of it. ... The state recognizes Platte-Napa. They've got an operator on it. The operator is Dakota Southern.'

But Commissioner Deb Bodenstedt said consultations with Darin Bergquist, Secretary of Transportation for South Dakota, contradicted this.

'According to the program manager for the South Dakota Department of Transportation and the secretary of transportation, there is no record (with) the Secretary of State of Yankton County belonging to that authority," Bobenstedt said.

This mirrors what she said at the April 7 meeting of the County Commission. The current Napa-Platte

Rail Authority includes only Bon Homme and Charles Mix

(counties)," Bodenstedt said earlier this month. "There is no record of Yankton County being part of the railroad authority, per the Secretary of State's office."

State law doesn't prohibit the county from belonging to two.

Woods said there are a number of advantages a regional rail authority would give the county.

"I think (the advantage is to) have the local control over our track," he said. "Having the opportunity for federal funds. Having that local control is going to be so much advantageous for our county. Yankton Area Progres-

sive Growth president John Kramer was also in attendance at Tuesday's meeting and said the authorities are quite common and help bring in more federal funds for smaller railroads.

There's more than 30 of these rail authorities (in South Dakota) and it's a national program," Kramer said. "There's something like 3,000 of them across the United States. One of the biggest advantages it allows is a conduit to federal funds. The federal government has something like \$52 billion sitting in loan programs that short-line rail companies can access through these rail authorities and through the
