

USDA Seeks Apps. For Rural Businesses Support

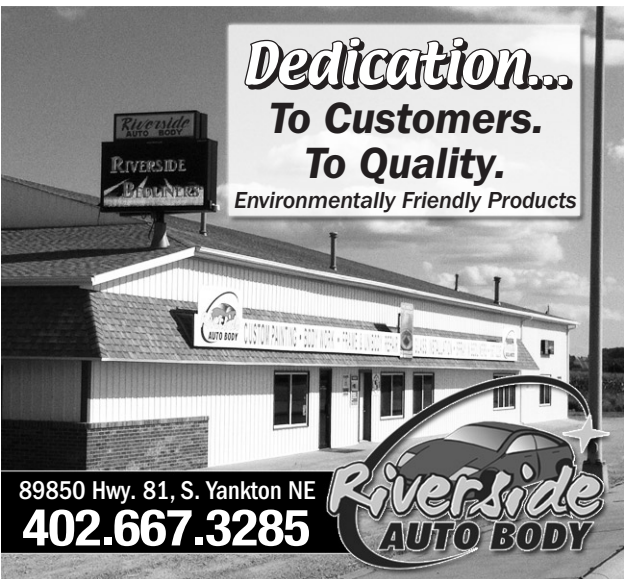
WASHINGTON — Agriculture Under Secretary Lisa Mensah has announced that USDA is seeking applications for grants to support rural businesses and help create jobs.

"This USDA funding will ensure continued investments in rural businesses," Mensah said. "Too often, rural businesses and the communities they serve lack access to the capital and resources they need to grow and thrive. These grants will help remedy that and allow all Americans the chance to share in the nation's economic recovery."

More than \$28 million is expected to be available under the Rural Business Development Grant (RBDG) program. Eligible applicants include public bodies, government entities, Indian tribes and non-profit organizations.

RBDG funds can be used for technical assistance, establishment of small business revolving loan funds and the acquisition of land, buildings and infrastructure to enhance business development. In addition, funds can be used to support business incubators, feasibility studies and business plans, long-term strategic business planning, leadership and entrepreneurial training.

Pre-applications for competition for the Nebraska allocated funds are due by close of business, 4:30 p.m. CT, Friday, May 1, 2015. All pre-applications are to be sent by email to the following address: [diane.pavel@ne.usda.gov](mailto:diane.pavel@ne.usda.gov).

KNOX CO. SHERIFF'S REPORT

On April 13, 2015, at about 5:44 p.m., it was reported to the Knox County Sheriff's Office that a South Dakota plated pickup was reported to be abandoned about half-mile south of the Highway 12 and 531 Ave. intersection on 531 Ave. The pickup was parked in some trees. Upon investigating the abandoned vehicle, it was discovered that the vehicle was stolen from Davison County, South Dakota. The vehicle was a 2004 Gray Ford Ranger belonging to Mike Bathke of Mitchell, South Dakota. The pickup was reported stolen on the morning of April 12, 2015, at about 7:15 a.m. The pickup received minimal damage and the keys were left with it when it was abandoned. The vehicle was placed in impound and the Sheriff's Office is working with the Davison County Sheriff's Office to determine who stole the vehicle and left it in Nebraska.

On April 13, 2015, at about 7:34 p.m., the Knox County Sheriff's Office received a report of a one vehicle accident about two tenths of a mile west of the 881 Rd and 519Ave intersection on 881Rd. The vehicle was a black 1992 GMC Sierra K2500 owned by James Cook of rural Verdigre, Nebraska. The driver of the vehicle was a juvenile. The driver stated that he was traveling west on 881 Rd. when he came around a curve and was blinded by the sun. The driver left the roadway to the right, overcorrected to the left and again overcorrected to the right where the vehicle rolled and landed on its top in the west bound ditch. The driver was the sole occupant and seatbelt was in use. The vehicle was totaled. The Verdigre Police Department assisted with the accident.

On April 19, 2015, at 5:43 a.m., the Knox County Sheriff's Office received a report of an two vehicle accident with injuries. The Knox County Sheriff's Office investigated the two vehicle injury accident, which was located a quarter-mile south of 876 Road on 515 Ave. A 2003 Chevy pickup driven by Brian Oglevie of Seward, Nebraska, was northbound on 515 Ave. in route to go turkey hunting in rural Knox County. Due to heavy rain, the road and culvert were washed out sometime during the nighttime hours. Oglevie's vehicle drove into the washout and hit the embankment on the north side of the washout. Oglevie was trapped inside the vehicle. The second vehicle, a 1996 Chevy Corsica driven by Amy Clemens of rural Knox County was Southbound on 515 Avenue. Clemens didn't see the pickup owned by Oglevie, which was partially hidden after driving into the washout. Clemens' vehicle ramped over the top of the pickup, collided with the opposite embankment and then overturned on the roadway. Clemens was then trapped inside of her vehicle. Verdigre Fire and Rescue responded to the scene and extricated both drivers from their vehicles. Both Clemens and Oglevie were the transported to the Avera Creighton hospital by Verdigre EMT's. They were both treated and transferred on from there by air ambulances. The status of Oglevie and Clemens is unknown at this time.

Both vehicles were totaled in the collisions. Jimson Towing of Orchard and Butch's Towing of Royal were both needed to recover the vehicles, which were then towed to Butch's Towing in Royal.


