Some Of I-90 Might Return To 75 MPH

PIERRE – A lengthy stretch of Interstate 90 in western South Dakota might see the speed limit permanently rolled back from 80 mph to 75 under a proposal by the state Transportation Commission.

The commission decided Thursday to officially consider setting the speed limit at 75 mph on I-90 from the Wyoming border to the Rapid City area, a stretch of about 55 miles.

There also could be a special 65 mph zone on I-90 for the 26-mile segment between Sturgis and Rapid City that would be in effect July 24 through Aug. 10 this year.

Extremely high traffic is expected during the seventy-fifth annual motorcycle rally at Sturgis. Rapid City is a hub for many of the bikers attending the rally.

A five-mile stretch of I-90 at Sturgis already is specially set at 65 mph from Aug. 1 through Aug. 15 because of the rally.

The new proposal calls for permanently extending the duration for that special 65 mph zone, by changing the annual starting date to July 24.

The special 45 mph zone on Highway 79 for 1.5 miles north of the Highway 34 junction on the east edge of Sturgis could see its starting date permanently changed to July 24 as well. The 45 mph zone currently runs Aug. 1 through Aug. 15.

Another proposed change related to the rally would similarly change the starting date to July 24 the 35 mph limit on Highway 34 in Sturgis, going from Blanche Street east for 3.8 miles. The 35 mph limit currently covers Aug.

City Council member Michelle Erpenbach this week voted in favor of funding the website but criticized the ads promoting it, saying they look "like somebody's campaign ad."

"That is the only negative that I have heard about this project, and I've heard it repeatedly," Erpenbach said. "Why is it not pictures of people who live here? Show the diversity. Show the opportunities that are here."

Community Development Director Darrin Smith said the billboards aren't intended to promote Huether and his political career.

"If there is a better person in any city to introduce people to their city and welcome them, it's the mayor," Smith said. "I would say that about any mayor in America."

Šioux Falls resident Debbie Riter disagreed.

"I don't want my taxpayer dollars spent on promoting one person," Riter said. "I want them to promote, really, our community and what we are trying to do with jobs."

Huether declined comment to the *Argus Leader*.

Huether earlier this month unveiled the website and ad campaign aimed at attracting applicants for more than 2,000 unfilled jobs. It involves the website www.SiouxFallsHas-Jobs.com, and billboard and

This summer, Yankton County Deputy Treasurer Patty Vavra will be dropping the "deputy" designation from her title.

In March, treasurer Pam Marchand announced she would be retiring effective July 1 and asked that the Yankton County Commission appoint Vavra to take her place after holding the position since 1997. And at their April 7 meeting, the Commission unanimously appointed Vavra to take over the position on July 1.

Before she joined the treasurer's office, Vavra was in banking, and she told the *Press & Dakotan* this helped create a business relationship between her and Marchand.

1 through Aug. 15.

The commission voted Thursday to set a public hearing on those possible changes for May 28 in Pierre.

The hearing will start at 9 a.m. CT in the commission's meeting room at the Becker-Hansen Building, 700 E. Broadway Ave.

Last month the Legislature increased the speed limit for South Dakota's two interstate highways to 80 mph from 75.

The change to 80 mph came as part of a broad package of tax and fee increases to provide more funding for maintenance and repair of highways

Double S Bull Co. LLC. Set For Riverboat Days Return

Get ready for another wild August in Yankton as the Yankton Rodeo Association has secured the Double S Bull Company LLC.'s extreme bull riding tour for the annual Yankton Riverboat Days festival this August.

It will be the fourth straight year the Sidney, Iowa-based company will be supplying the livestock for the Yankton event, which is set for Aug. 22.

Double S, which is owned by Shad and Vicki Smith, has won Stock Contractor of the Year at the Bullriders of America Awards 12 times, along with garnering other awards and honors.

Shad, who is also vice-president of the Bull Riders Of Americas (BOA), said it's

hard to believe that this successful business started out as a hobby.

"I rode bulls for about 13 years, and I first started off just having practice bulls of my own," he said. "Even then, I had bulls better than some of the bull stock contractors around. I started leasing a little bit, and the hobby got entirely go out of hand. It's turned into a full-time business. We have been putting on bull riding for a little over 20 years now, and we have the biggest tour in the Midwest, and perhaps the best tour in the country."

Smith said the first time his company came to Yankton, things weren't looking up for the Riverboat Days event.

"Contestant-wise, that rodeo was starting
