this office in good form." Vavra said there's plenty of work to do over the next

few months to prepare. "I'm familiar with a lot of what (Marchand's) done as far as the investing and stuff like that," she said. "I'm going to have to learn some laws and there's a lot of things I'm going to have to learn, and I'm looking forward to learning.

... Next month I'm going to a spring workshop. I've been to a couple of deputy workshops, but never to this one (because it's) actually for the treasurers. I'm hoping to learn a lot there and from other treasurers. I think there's a lot of good ones especially around here in neighboring counties —that I'm looking forward to working with and being able to lean on

Vavra said the move didn't come as a shock.

"It wasn't really a totally unexpected thing," she said. "She named me her first deputy about six or seven years ago. ... As time progressed, she taught me more things and then she was planning on retiring. The hope was I would take her place, so it was something we were kind of hoping for anyway.

Marchand said she's been helping prepare Vavra for quite some time.

"This has been in my plan for at least a year, possibly two years, and so slowly, I talked to her about, 'When I leave,

would she want to do this job?' and she showed some interest," she said. "We've gone over different things I do like tax certificates, tax problems, DMV and showed her how to do everything."

Going forward, Vavra said the biggest challenge will be a mostly-new staff.

"My first deputy, she's got six years of experience, so she's been with us for quite some time, and she's good and comfortable," she said. "But now we've got pretty much all now we've got pretty inuch an new people other than that. I think it's going to be a little bit of a challenge, but I think it's also going to be a good thing."

She added her main goal

will to be to increase the department's use of technology.

"We've been, over the years, trying to get a little more automated," she said. "We're hoping to be more efficient — not that we're not efficient now — and do more things online."

Marchand said she'll continue to provide support in any way she can.

"Because Patty will be taking over and I'll be staying in Yankton, I'm just a phone call away if there is anything (she needs)," she said. "But I'm sure she'll do a great job and won't have very many questions at all.

Vavra said she's ready for the challenge.

"I'm looking forward to further serving the taxpayers of Yankton County and everybody else who comes through our doors," she said.
