from Celebrate Recovery is: I am broken and only Christ can fix and heal that," Green said. "I was living a sober life and gaining more recovery all the time with the faith I had, but Celebrate Recovery helped me take that relationship, with God to a new level. Today I am at peace with my past. I don't fret or worry about my future. My relationship with God has provided me with a peace that is indescribable.

Green feels he owes a price for what he has. This is the reason he mentors.

"During my recovery, God had placed some wonderful people in my live; recovering and nonrecovering people who had left an impression, guided me, and helped mold me to who I am today," Green said. "I never realized this until I had been sober for a while. But looking back today I can see where God continued to work through people to help me. For that I feel I must do the

Philippines, China Trade Accusations Over Sea Threats

MANILA, Philippines (AP) The Philippines accused China of aggressive maneuvers against its reconnaissance plane and fishermen in disputed seas where Beijing has stepped up construction of artificial islands, but China reiterated its claim on the strategic waterways.

A Chinese vessel flashed powerful lights and radioed the Philippine navy plane to leave the area near one of the islands in the Spratlys chain in the South China Sea, Philippine military spokesman Lt. Col. Harold Ĉabunoc said Friday. "This is an aggressive

action on the part of the Chinese vessel," Cabunoc said. 'They said, 'You're entering Chinese territory, leave.' He said the incident

happened on Sunday closed to Subi Reef, which is near

Pag-asa —also called Thitu - Ĭsland, which has been occupied by Philippine troops since the 1970s. Among the hundreds of spratly isles, coral reefs and shoals, less than 50 are occupied by troops from countries with competing claims — the Philippines, Vietnam, China, Taiwan, Malaysia and Brunei.

China claims most of the South China Sea on historical grounds and in recent years has dispatched more vessels and patrols to stake its claim, alarming neighbors. Satellite images have shown massive reclamation work on seven islands, which the Philippines and the U.S. say could be used to build bases for refueling naval and air patrols and establishing a

stronger military presence. In Beijing, Foreign Ministry spokesman Hong Lei said that

Philippine planes had "illegally flown over Chinese waters on numerous occasions recently" and that Chinese forces had issued a radio warning. He said it was "untrue" that a powerful light was used against the Philippine plane.

He said that China's armed forces will continue to conduct surveillance over the waters and skies in the area, the official Xinhua News Agency reported.

He also dismissed a report by the Philippine Fisheries Bureau that the Chinese coast guard earlier this month fired a water canon at Filipino fishermen and seized some of their catch near Scarborough Shoal, which China seized from the Philippines in 2012. Hong said the shoal was Chinese territory and urged the Philippines to ensure its fishermen are aware of the "illegality of fishing" there.

Mohatt said this is not exactly the case.

"But people do get better," he said. "They get better

Mohatt stressed the importance of giving hope rather than snatching it away, especially with issues centered around military personnel.

"We do stuff all the time that steals hope and we need to think about that when we're working with veterans, (National) Guard and Reserves," he said. "Our job as healer is to, if nothing else, provide hope and not steal it.

Mohatt spoke of his experience as part of a study in Kansas conducted by WICHE and the Department of Defense between 2010 and

"What we wanted to see was, 'Would mental health first aid, adapted to a military population 'be an effective prevention and responsive thing to use with the Guard?" he said.

Mohatt pointed out that all but a few of the counties in Kansas were considered "mental health professional shortage areas." The vast majority of the state's National Guard armories were located within these shortage areas.

'What our notion was is, 'Could we give the skills to community providers — community first responders — to be effective helpers in a situation of a low-volume of professional helpers?" Mohatt said.

From there, researchers set out teaching what is known as "mental health first aid" to these first respond-

Mohatt explained the methods involved.

"It's a tool, and I can tell you it's a tool worth using, he said. "You train folks in the community to be able to be responsive. They learn a five-step action plan to respond, to be responsive, to assess, to listen, to give reassurance, to encourage appropriate professional help to make a referral and to encourage self-help and other support systems."

He said it's a beneficial method that was tailored to fit with issues facing the military.

'It increases knowledge, it helps have a general action plan and it may reduce barriers to treatment," he said. "So our adaptation focused on military veteran populations, and we tailored it to the issues that Guard, Reserve and veterans' face. We had an advisory panel of military medical corps members and also individuals from the Guard."

The study sought to find out if it would raise awareness of the issues, reduce stigma and increase likelihood to help others.

Mohatt said following the training, they checked back on these communities periodically and found some positive results.

'We learned that it does, in fact, increase knowledge around mental health," he said. "It increased and it increased significantly. It reduced stigma among the population that we measured. — Military mental health first aid increased the willingness to help among the folks that we trained.

Ultimately, Mohatt said, this research is about helping members of the military "come home."

'What we talked about here today is how communities can work together to help veterans, Guard and Reserve return home and lead healthy lives," he said.

It was a sad arrival for the unloaded from the train and Nazi soldiers divided them into two groups. Women and children were herded in one group and loaded back on the train with the Nazi promise they would get a shower and a better life. The men and young boys were loaded to go to a labor camp.

"I never got to say goodbye to my mother, sister and grandmother," Gans said. "I didn't know they would go to that shower and be gassed and we would never see each

other again." The Nazis took their jewelry and shaved their heads — men and women alike and sold their hair for wigs.

In the concentration camp, the Jews worked alongside POWs, Russian woman and criminals. They carried cement bags, railroad rails and stamped cement day in and day out. In the first month, the prisoners lost six to nine pounds and by the three-month mark, were nothing but skin and bones. "Whatever I tell you, im-

agine 10 times worse and the people's suffering was still worse than that," Gans said. When the prisoners could no longer work, they were

sent to the gas chambers. If they tried to escape, they were hanged. Some prisoners even committed suicide by walking into the electrically-wired barbed fence and getting jolted with a life-ending bolt of electricity. They took showers every 8-10 days with no soap or towel, and a bowl for clear

Gans' brother eventually got blood poisoning and was sent to a gas chamber. His father was in the camp until the Russians started invading Germany and the German soldiers made the prisoners start the death march to Flossenberg. He died one month from liberation by the American Army.

Gans advice for the students at Crofton High School was to erase the hate — hate is corrosive. He also asked them to speak out.

"Do not let anyone tell you that the Holocaust did not exist, because today. I am here and living proof, Haftling (prisoner) 139755, it did happen," Gans said.
