Divers will learn to develop basic search patterns to find things under water. This is not necessarily looking for people. We also look for evidence that is not easy to see. In the advanced class that we took with the Dynamite Divers, it takes that to the next level."

The training taught the divers more advanced techniques to better their skills in emergency situations.

"These techniques are not used as often and are specialized and take a little more skill," he said. "They are used in different situations. There is always a standard baseline, but they also push you to try new ways of doing things. There are many different variations of how you can search underwater."

The class first started out in the Summit Center Pool to freshen up on some basic skills the divers learned in their public safety divers training.

After the first day, the divers dove right into some more intense training in more

Awarded the 2015 World Archery Youth Championships last May, Yankton — and the NFAA — beat out other considered locations such as Mexico City, with its population of 8 million.

"This is tremendous exposure," Moore said. "Not only for South Dakota or the United States, but if you think about all the kids from all over the world, it's absolutely amazing."

It's that exposure, with a

global audience focused on Yankton, which could have implications far beyond the 7-day tournament, according to Paul Lewkowicz, an NFAA state director from Massachusetts.

"I was ecstatic when it was awarded," he said. "That just means more exposure to young archers."

Which is exactly the goal of the NFAA, he added.

"For us, the young people are absolutely critical," Lewkowicz said. "A lot of the archers are getting more senior, so when we can get the younger kids shooting, that's all better for us."

Part of the preparation process for the World Archery

Youth Championships has involved education, Wenande said.

"As we're out in the community working to get sponsorships and volunteers, it's a great way for us to promote the different types of archery we have," she said. "Most people drive by and only see the building. They wouldn't know all the work back in the trees or out on the ranges."

With six weeks to go before the tournament, Wenande said one of the biggest non-archery tasks still to check off her list is volunteers. There are approximately 300 of 400 shifts filled, she said.

"We need a lot more volunteers, in a variety of positions,

all of them with no archery skills," Wenande said.

Eliciting support from the Yankton community doesn't figure to be an issue, according to Judy McCutcheon-Adams, the NFAA state director from Illinois.

"One of the things I heard (Sunday) is how everyone in this community embraces archery," McCutcheon-Adams said. "Everywhere you go, folks in the stores know. It's not just, 'Is there something going on?'"

"They know; they live it."

could receive it, and would not allow patients to ingest the drug by smoking it.

DEATH PENALTY

A bill to abolish the death penalty won first-round approval earlier this month, but its path through the Legislature isn't guaranteed.

Lawmakers voted 30-13 to advance the bill, showing just enough support to override Gov. Pete Ricketts' promised veto.

Yet even with a bipartisan

majority, supporters of the bill may have to overcome filibusters by conservative lawmakers before the required the second- and third-round votes. Breaking a filibuster requires at least 33 senators, and votes on such procedural issues could prevent it from advancing.

Sen. Ernie Chambers of Omaha, who has fought to eliminate the death penalty for more than four decades, warned after the initial vote that nothing is final.

DRIVER'S LICENSES FOR DEFERRED-ACTION YOUTHS

Lawmakers haven't begun first-round debate on a bill that would allow driver's licenses for youths who

brought to the United States illegally as young children, but allowed to stay under President Barack Obama's federal deferred-action program. Nebraska is the only state that still denies licenses to such youths.

The bill by Sen. Jeremy Nordquist of Omaha has won support from a majority of lawmakers, business and agriculture groups, and man Republicans, including Omaha Mayor Jean Stothert. But it's strongly opposed by some conservative senators.

"These are hardworking Nebraskans, and I say 'Nebraskans' because they've been here their whole lives," Nordquist said. "They are a net positive for the state, and

this will help strengthen our communities."

FUEL TAX

A proposed increase in Nebraska's fuel tax won initial approval from lawmakers, 26-10, but it faces two more rounds of debate before going to Ricketts, who has promised a veto. The measure would phase in a 6-cent increase over four years, raising the total tax to 31.6 cents per gallon.

Sen. Jim Smith of Papillion said he introduced the bill to help pay for maintenance for the state's aging bridges and roads. Opponents say the tax increase will disproportionately affect the poor because many spend a larger proportion of their incomes on gas.
