

manager Paul Scherschligt notified the media Monday night that the burn ban was set to go into effect at midnight. That means the ban is in

effect as of today (Tuesday).

"Due to recent fires with in the county, the fires chief(s) have determined to put the burn (ban) back on," he said. "The fires (Monday) were burning green grass and spreading quickly without a strong wind to push it. With the lack of moisture in our area, conditions continue to get worse.'

Any piles of debris that may still be burning

need to be monitored closely and buried, Scher-

Yankton deputy fire chief Larry Nickles said Monday's blazes showed the need for continued caution. These fires give you an idea of the conditions,'

he said. "People still need to use extreme caution." The dry conditions look to continue, according to South Dakota state climatologist Dennis Todey. "The May outlook calls for equal chances of normal, above-normal and below-normal temperatures



#### Boys & **Girls Club Closer To** Reality

The dream of a new Boys & Girls Club facility in Yankton cleared yet another hurdle during a meeting of the Yankton City Commission Monday night.

The commission voted unanimously to approve a conditional use permit for the facility, which is set to be on the grounds of Yankton Middle School.

Community Development Director Dave Mingo said this is a process all school additions need to go through and that he'd heard

no objections raised over it. "Additions to schools, or projects such as this — a youth community center are required to go through a conditional use process where the neighborhood is notified," Mingo said. "We've gone through that notification process. We haven't received any comments to date from our publications and mailings."

Mingo added that much of the discussion with the Planning Commission revolved around parking, saying the school's original intent has left it with an over-abundance of parking.

'The discussion at the Planning Commission revolved primarily around parking and traffic," he said. The site was designed to be a high school originally so parking far exceeds the requirements associated with a middle school, so
