

Safety Concerns Send Orioles, White Sox To The Showers

BALTIMORE (AP) — The Baltimore Orioles' home game against the Chicago White Sox was postponed Monday night because of safety concerns after riots broke out near Camden Yards following the funeral of Freddie Gray.

Baseball Commissioner Rob Manfred, at the stadium for a previously planned visit, said Tuesday night's game between the Orioles and White Sox could be moved — possibly to Nationals Park in Washington — if safety continued to be an issue.

Rioters looted stores and threw rocks and bricks at Baltimore police about three miles from the stadium in the wake of the mysterious death of Gray. He died April 19 after suffering a severe spinal injury in police custody.

The Orioles announced the

postponement about 40 minutes before gametime. About 1,000 fans were inside the stadium at the time, and many gates already had been closed.

The team said the game was called off after consultation with police. The White Sox were in Baltimore for the start of a three-game series.

"We feel like we made the decision that would provide us the greatest possible security in terms of protecting the fans, the players, the umpires, everybody involved in the game," Manfred said. "I don't know what more I can say about it at this point."

Prior to the game, Orioles players gathered around a television in the clubhouse and watched the violence unfold. Police blocked off several streets near Camden Yards.

"There's so many things that go on that you get challenged with, obviously this is a different level," Orioles manager Buck Showalter said. "There's not a lot of experience with it."

"So you try to take each moment as it comes and I know there were a lot of calls to some guys' families about making sure they knew what was going on from a safety standpoint. But guys are watching it. They are all aware of what's going on," he said.

White Sox manager Robin Ventura said his team was aware of the escalating situation.

"I mean we're definitely keeping tabs on it. If there's anything to do, to go ahead and respond to it. But you know, it's concerning to anybody, I think, any time it becomes a violent protest, everybody is on

high alert and you're trying to do what's best for the game and the players," he said.

There was no immediate word on a makeup date for Monday's game.

Major League Baseball has postponed and shifted games in the past because of unrest.

In 1992, the Dodgers had four games postponed in Los Angeles following the Rodney King verdict.

In 1967, the Orioles and Tigers had a game postponed because of riots in Detroit. The next two games were shifted to Baltimore.

Fans With Tickets To Saturday's Game Being Offered Tickets To Another Game

BALTIMORE (TNS) — Orioles fans who

attended Saturday's game during the Freddie Gray protests are being offered an opportunity to return to Camden Yards for a later date.

The Orioles sent an email this afternoon to fans who purchased tickets online for Saturday's game, announcing that those who "may not have had the premier Oriole Park experience" during that contest against the Red Sox will be eligible to receive complimentary tickets to a home game later this season.

The announced crowd for Saturday's game was 36,757 but appeared to be much smaller.

During the ninth inning of Saturday's game, Mayor Stephanie Rawlings-Blake asked that all fans and staff in attendance remain inside the stadium until further notice "due to an ongoing public safety issue" while protests turned violent in downtown Baltimore. The gates to Camden Yards were closed for only an inning, but it was enough to create a bit of a stir late in the game.

Those who purchased tickets will receive another email in the coming days, detailing instructions on how to redeem their tickets for a future Orioles game. Instructions will also be provided for fans who did not purchase tickets online.

Krause No-Hitter Helps MMC To Sweep

Softball: Lancers Match Highest Victories Total In Last 10 Years

Amber Krause made school history and didn't even know about it until it was over.

Even if her teammates all knew what was happening.

The sophomore pitcher for the Mount Marty College softball team threw the program's first-ever no-hitter, with a 4-0 victory in the first game of Monday's softball doubleheader against Dakota State at Riverside Park.

"It felt like I should have been throwing that way all year," Krause said. "It felt good to finally come out and show people what we can do."

All Krause wanted to do was help the Lancers (13-26) finish the season on a high note. That's what she thought she had done as she and her teammates celebrated the game one victory — Mount Marty then won game two 9-0 in five innings.

When did she realize she recorded a no-hitter?

"Not until our book person said 'no-hitter,' and I was like, 'Oh cool,'" Krause said.

Krause struck out eight batters and allowed only three runners to reach base, two by error. A ground out to third ended the game, and set off a mild celebration.

"We all knew," senior outfielder Lauren Orwig said, smiling. "But you don't ever say it until it's over."

"She pitched an awesome game. I'm glad she was able to pull it out."

Not only did Krause enter the Mount Marty record books, she helped the Lancers finish the season with 13 wins, the most for the program since 2005 — and one off the school record, since softball was reinstated in 2001.

As such, there was understandably a 'nothing-to-lose'

mindset for Mount Marty.

"Definitely," Krause said. "The last four games, that's all we did, and we ended up

beating Hastings (Saturday). It's the mindset we wanted to have, to have fun out here."

And that's exactly what the Lancers did, particularly at the plate.

The home team pounded out 20 hits in the doubleheader, led by sophomore outfielder Karlee Kozak who went 5-for-7 with a pair of triples, four runs scored and four RBI.

"It felt good," Kozak said. "We've been struggling hitting, but we finally turned it around."

"And I've actually been in a slump, too. I finally found it."

Although they lost 10 consecutive games before last weekend, the Lancers closed the season with three wins in their last four games to help reach the 13-victory mark.

It was a 5-game improvement from a year ago, and there was a reason for that jump, according to Orwig.

"We've had a rough couple of years, but this year the group of girls we had all stuck together and worked hard," she said. "We were able to finish with some wins."

"That's big for them going into the fall."

Mount Marty will graduate three seniors, with Orwig, Sophia Lopez and Shaina Lonnen, but will return seven starters — Krause, Kozak, Olivia Rodriguez, Cassidy Janicek, Jessica Wirth, Jenn Mitera and Kelsey Mitera. The two pitchers in game two, Katie Groteluschen and
