Looks For Answer At

VERMILLION – With the spring season over, the University of South Dakota football team will head into the summer months with some questions to answer.

Perhaps the most immediate is quarterback. Specifically, who assumes the starting duties when the Coyotes report for fall practices in early August? Kevin Earl or Ryan

With Earl, a senior, missing all of spring practices with a back injury, the junior Saeger took all the firstteam snaps during the 14 practices and completed 9-of-17 passes in Saturday's spring game.

"Sitting out of all spring ball last year didn't help me at all, but then I got some time in the fall," Saeger said. "It was nice for me to have this spring and be healthy coming into it.

"It's all about taking advantages of these opportunities.

Saeger, a 6-foot-4 Wisconsin native, was thrown into a similar situation last fall. When Earl broke a bone in his hand during the season opener at Oregon, Saeger started the next four games, leading the Coyotes to a 2-2 record.

At the time, though, there wasn't time to sit back and see how Earl healed up. Saeger was thrust immediately into the job, and then went back to the sidelines when Earl returned for the final seven games.

It's a different situation now; given the program has four months over the summer. In the meantime, though, the team heads into the summer having seen progression from Saeger.

'He looks like the kind of guy that can drive the car and do a good job," head coach Joe Glenn said. "He's taken a lot of reps this spring, and I'm real impressed with him as far as

protecting the ball, being a leader on and off the field."

As for Earl? He was back home in Illinois for a bulk of the spring season to heal a lower back injury.

"He called to say he had it fixed," Glenn said. "He had to convalesce a little bit and then he'd be back by (Sunday night), then get working with our therapist to see what we can do to get him ready.'

In the case of Saeger, all he could do, he said, was improve on what he thought needed work from last season. Primarily making better reads,

With all the first-team reps he got, Saeger also said his confidence skyrocketed.

"This game is all about confidence, and as a quarterback you have to be confident in your abilities," he said. "That's what showed for me."

And his teammates noticed, as

"I thought the whole spring, he did really well," said Nick Jensen, a redshirt freshman offensive lineman from Vermillion. "He stepped up from last year and took a better leadership The quarterback situation is far

from the only area worth keeping an eye for the Coyotes. They will enter the summer months needing their top two running backs (Trevor Bouma, Khorey Kilgore) to recover from lingering injuries, as well as two returning starters on the offensive line (Derek Chancellor, Sam McLer-

"I don't think any of our injuries are bad enough that we'll hold a kid out for fall," Glenn said. "We've got some time now to get on the mend and get ready for September.

We need to have everybody healthy, I know that."

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Nets Tie Series With Atlanta

NEW YORK (AP) — Deron Williams rebounded from two dismal games with 35 points, and the Brooklyn Nets pulled out a 120-115 overtime victory over the Atlanta Hawks on Monday night, tying the series at two games apiece.

The Nets, just 38-44 in the regular season, won the second straight in the series and moved two victories from becoming the sixth No. 8 seed to beat a No. 1 — only the fourth since the first round became best-of-seven.

Bojan Bogdanovic made the go-ahead 3-pointer with 1:25 left in overtime but the Nets never would have gotten there without Williams, whose 16 points in the fourth quarter were two fewer than he had total in the first three games of the series.

Brook Lopez had 26 points and 10 rebounds for the Nets. Jeff Teague had 20 points and 11 assists, and DeMarre Carroll added 20 points and nine rebounds for the Hawks, who host Game 5 on Wednes-

Kyle Korver had 16 points and 11 rebounds, but the NBA's leading 3-point shooter during the regular season missed three straight from behind the arc in the final seconds with the Hawks trailing by three.

The Nets finally got the rebound and former Hawks star Joe Johnson closed it out with two free throws, ending what was by far the best game of the series and perhaps the most memorable one in the 3-season history of NBA basketball in Brooklyn.

Neither team had reached 100 points in any of the first three games and the Hawks had made only 39 percent of their shots. But they were mostly back in the form that produced 60 wins in the regular season — but the Nets were just a little better.

That's mostly because of Villiams, who was 1 for 7 and 1 for 8 in the last two games, sitting out the last 16 minutes of Game 3 after hurting his tailbone and watching as the Nets seized control without him.

But he moved well and shot better Monday, making seven 3-pointers, including 4 of 4 in his fourth-quarter flurry.

He had only two free throws in overtime, capping the Nets' run of seven straight points after Al Horford gave Atlanta its last lead, 113-111 with 1:44 remaining.

Williams is a two-time Olympic gold medalist but has battled injuries since signing a five-year, \$98.5 million contract in 2012. He averaged just 13 points during the regular season, and when he followed that with a dismal start to this series, coach Lionel Hollins had to defend his point guard from criticism during practice

Williams then saved the Nets from a 3-1 deficit with his huge fourth quarter, when he even hit a turnaround 3-pointer from well behind the arc as the shot clock was set to expire.

Millsap had 16 points and 12 rebounds for the Hawks, who had beaten the Nets six straight times this season before Brooklyn won both games here.

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Kuznetsov's Goal Leads Capitals Past Islanders 2-1 In Game Seven **LIGHTNING 5, RED WINGS 2:**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The precocious Russian forward drafted in the first round by the Washington Capitals finally delivered a breathtaking, winning goal in a Game 7. No, not Alex Ovechkin — Evgeny

Skating around every opponent on the ice, Kuznetsov scored the go-ahead goal with less than 7 1/2 minutes left in Game 7, and Braden Holtby only needed to make 10 saves Monday night, lifting the Washington Capitals past the New York Islanders 2-1 in the first round of the Eastern Conference playoffs.

Kuznetsov, a rookie, scored

the sort of athletic, breathtaking goal his better-known teammate, Ovechkin, often does, taking the puck from the right boards and heading across the ice before sending a rising shot over sprawling goalie Jaroslav

Joel Ward gave Washington a 1-0 lead late in the second period, and Frans Nielsen pulled New York even early in the third.

The Capitals now face the Presidents' Trophy-winning New York Rangers, who eliminated Washington from the 2012 and 2013 playoffs — in

Game 7 each time. That's part of a long history of postseason failures for the Capitals, including never advancing beyond the second round since Ovechkin arrived and started earning MVP trophies and leading the NHL in goals year after year. This was the eighth time in 10 playoff series involving Ovechkin that went to a Game 7, and his team was only 2-5 in such contests until Monday.

Until Kuznetsov, a 22-yearold center, came through, adding to the two goals and assist he had in Game 3.

The Islanders' loss ends their playing days at Nassau Coliseum, which opened in 1972. The team is moving to

Brooklyn next season. You have to go back 22 years to find a playoff series won by the Islanders, and that victory in 1993 came against — guess who? — the Capitals. Since then, New York has lost

This was the first Game 7 of this year's NHL playoffs and it was a fitting conclusion to this particular matchup, given how even these two teams are. Through the first six games, each team scored 14 goals. Each won on the road. Each won in overtime. And during the regular season, both finished with 101 standings points, and three of their four head-to-head meetings went to
