Yankton won 12 boys' and eight girls' events in a track and field dual with Sioux Falls O'Gorman on Tuesday at Williams Field.

Both teams held out several varsity athletes in preparation for both the Howard Wood Dakota Relays and O'Gorman Invitational later this week.

On the boys' side, Kenneth Schroeder won both the long jump (18-6.5) and triple jump (40-5.5), and Jordan Payer won both the shot put (43-8) and discus (125-10) for Yankton.
