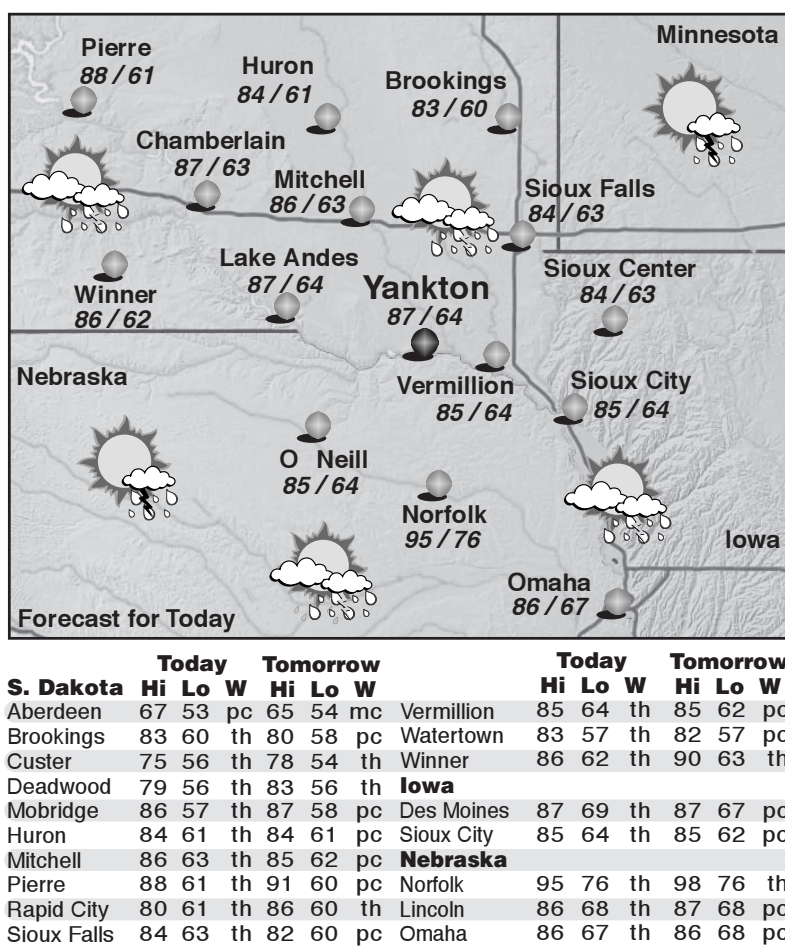

population 500, where the town board quickly approved the extension soon after the state law was passed in May. There's just two bars in town — one is also the town bowling alley — and both have been staying open until 2 a.m. on Friday and Saturday nights.

"This is a very small town and they'd do whatever we asked them to," Alisha Glesinger, owner of the Bottoms Up Bar, said of town officials. "We don't have the problems of big town hall meetings and arguments."

In Yutan, a town of 1,200 residents in eastern Nebraska, the city council approved the 2 a.m. closing time at a meeting where just one member of the public spoke — the owner of the only bar in town. Not surprisingly, it was to ask for extended hours.

"It was fairly quick and easy," said Yutan City Clerk Dawn Schmidt.

So is managing the new rule, another potential reason that more small towns than large have allowed bars to stay open longer.

In Yutan, local police don't have to worry about keeping officers out later every night or dealing with multiple bars because the bar owner lets them know when he'll be open late.

For 30 years Jim Moylan, a longtime lobbyist for the retail liquor industry in Nebraska, said he watched lawmakers kill bills that would have allowed bars to stay open until 2 a.m.

It passed this year after a couple of key compromises were made, including a requirement that bars only be allowed to stay open later if at least two-thirds of a city council or county board agreed to it.

Also, lawmakers were persuaded by the argument that bars in border cities, namely Omaha, were losing customers to other states.

Nebraska was one of just a half-dozen states with a mandated closing time of 1 a.m. All the states that border Nebraska have let bars stay open until 2 a.m.

"I'm surprised the border cities haven't accepted this," Moylan said of the 2 a.m. option.

City officials in a few larger and midsize border towns — Scottsbluff, South Sioux City and Nebraska City — said they were doubtful that 2 a.m. closing times would be approved. South Sioux City Administrator Lance Hedquist said that if there was going to be a request, it probably would have been made already. Nebraska City Administrator Pat Haverty said that if a proposal was made, it probably wouldn't pass because of the conservative nature of the town.

Elected leaders in Scottsbluff have a proposal before them. But the mayor doesn't think it's going anywhere.

"I think they're going to sway toward being conservative," and there haven't been a lot of people pushing for a change, said Scottsbluff Mayor Kandy Meininger.

"I'm impressed and humbled. People are really getting fed up with binge drinking."

The Beatrice City Council on Monday turned down a request to extend bar hours, with one council member expressing worries that it would hurt families.

City councils in large towns like Kearney and Grand Island, haven't even had a proposal to consider — no one has requested a change.

Meanwhile, in tiny Yutan, the town's only bar owner is waiting for another chance to stay open longer.

"I'd be open 24 hours a day if I could," said Russ Oviatt, owner of the Rusty Rooster.
