PUBLIC NOTICE OF INTENT TO PREPARE A PROGRAMMATIC ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT (PEA)

SUMMARY: The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) announces its intent to prepare a Programmatic Environmental Assessment (PEA) for the proposed construction of permanent road grade raise projects throughout the State of South Dakota.

Due to long term inundation resulting from rising water levels and ongoing Presidential Declarations of a Federal Disaster resulting from repetitive spring flooding events some roads have and will be permanently inundated. The intent of the proposed projects is to reduce continued inundation and maintenance and to restore these road segments to pre-disaster function and capacity by raising these road segments above the current water elevation. Increasing the height of the project also necessitates widening of the road footprint. Much of the proposed project funding will be provided to projects under FEMA's Public Assistance Program as authorized by the Stafford Act. Matching funds will be provided through the South Dakota State Department of Emergency Services and local government applicants. Road raise projects must meet all FEMA requirements for funding as a road grade raise project under a Disaster Specific Guidance.

FEMA hereby publishes notice of intent to prepare a Programmatic Environmental Assessment (PEA) for these actions, pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act (PL 91-190) and associated environmental statutes, as implemented in FEMA's regulations 44 CFR Part 10. This PEA will address the purpose and need of the proposed projects, project alternatives considered, affected environment, environmental consequences, and impact mitigation measures. Once completed, the DRAFT PEA will be available for public review and comment. Notice is also published in accordance with Executive Order 11988, Floodplain Management and Executive Order 11990, Wetlands Protection; as implemented in 44 CFR Part 9, since these actions may affect the floodplain and wetlands.

In addition to the proposed action, the following alternatives will be considered in the programmatic EA: (1) The NO ACTION ALTERNATIVE considers the consequences of not raising the road in place, (2) Road Relocation Alternative, (3) Alternate Routes, and (4) Home Acquisitions.

A public comment period related to the alternatives as outlined or other possible alternatives will remain open for 15 days following publication of this notice. In addition to this initial comment period, a final comment period will be opened for notice of availability of the Draft PEA.

Comments will be accepted by the affected public; local, state, and federal agencies; and other interested parties in order to consider and evaluate environmental impacts of the proposed projects. Gov: Neb. Backs Immigration Law

LINCOLN, Neb. — Gov. Dave Heineman said Wednesday that he would likely back an Arizona-style immigration law for Nebraska, and Attorney General Jon Bruning said state lawmakers would get to consider such a bill when they convene again in January.

Bruning told The Associated Press on Wednesday that he was "100 percent sure" such an immigration bill would be introduced in the next session.

Earlier, Heineman said at a news conference that he would likely support such a measure and that he has had several informal conversations with Bruning about how an Arizona-style law might work in Nebraska.

A federal judge last week blocked key aspects of the Arizona law from taking effect, including provisions requiring immigrants to carry their papers and banning illegal immigrants from soliciting employment in public places, and one allowing officers to make warrantless arrests of suspected illegal immigrants for crimes that can lead to deportation.

Critics of the law argued that it would lead to widespread racial profiling by law enforcement.

Bruning said Nebraska's bill would include a provision similar to Arizona's that requires law enforcement to check people's immigration status while enforcing other laws, because he thinks there's a good chance the provision will ultimately be upheld by the courts.

He declined to specify what parts of the Arizona law he thought were unconstitutional, but he said they wouldn't be included in the Nebraska bill.

Heineman's likely support of such a measure doesn't come as a surprise — he is a conservative Republican who often speaks out against illegal immigration. But he previously indicated that he wasn't sure an Arizona-style law would work in his state.

On Wednesday, he said he believes most Nebraskans support such a law.

"Conceptually, there is a lot about the Arizona law that has strong support in our state," Heineman said.

His Democratic opponent in the governor's race, Mike Meister, criticized Heineman's support of an Arizona-style bill in Nebraska.

"He would rather waste your money on a political sideshow than

talk about the real problems in Nebraska," Meister said in a statement. "An Arizona-style law would incite an instant lawsuit taking needed funds away from health and human services and education."

There are an estimated 45,000 illegal immigrants in Nebraska, which is about one-tenth the number in Arizona, according to the Pew Hispanic Center.

Nebraska isn't alone in pursuing an Arizona-type law even though it doesn't have a huge illegal immigrant population and is far from the border with Mexico. Conservative lawmakers in nearly 20 other states have said they hoped to follow in Arizona's footsteps.

Sen. Chris Langemeier, of Schuyler, who is a registered Republican, said he doubted that Heineman's support of an Arizona-style law would influence lawmakers' positions on a similar bill.

"On other issues his support makes a difference, but on this issue, deep down in everyone's mind they have an opinion so I don't think his weight behind it would make a difference," Langemeier said. He added that budget problems would likely consume lawmakers during the upcoming session and that "there will be a limited group that wants to tackle" an Arizona-style bill.

navigation, Becker said. The Corps is adjusting for the high water on a number of fronts, both good and bad, he said.

"We have had the power plants generating at full capacity for quite a while. The power generated from the mainstem dams will be higher this year," he said.

"On the other hand, I'm sure this impacts the endangered species. The islands have been flooded downstream. The tern and plover habitat has been limited by higher waters. The crews are monitoring the plover and tern population intensively."

The Corps plans construction of more sandbars for endangered species in the Niobrara, Neb., area starting this fall, Becker said.

The Corps needs to monitor not only the Missouri River but also the other bodies of water that dump into the river, he said.

"The James, Vermillion and Big Sioux are having really wet years," he said. "Our water management folks have to take that into consideration."

Gillispie expects the end of the tunnel may be in sight when it comes to flooding.

"As we get into the fall, if we just get back to normal precipitation in the area, the rivers will drop and everything will get back on track," he said. "The James should fall below flood stage before October or November, except for Stratford, which has a tendency to stay a little above flood stage for a longer period."

Buying time remains the key to flood control, Gillispie said.

"The key is to get back to normal or below normal precipitation for a couple of months to allow it to dry out," he said. "But then we may be looking at another winter with a big snowpack. We could be looking at another fun year next year."

The fall forecast calls for transitioning into a weak to moderate La Nina, Gillispie said.

"For the Northern Plains this fall, we should have above normal temperatures and above normal precipitation," he said. "We want to avoid that right now, but we at least have the possibility of looking at another wet fall."

Gillispie expects "pretty significant improvement" over the next two to three weeks, which should provide relief not only for flooding but also for those suffering mental fatigue from the aftermath.

"Right now, people are looking around and saying, here is another 2 or 3 inches of rain," he said. "But I don't see that happening again in the short term. The worst is over, and we should have more normal summertime activities and drying."

Even in the midst of flooding devastation, people find a silver lining in the dark clouds, Becker said. He noted the large number of visitors who come to enjoy the sights and sounds of releases from Gavins Point Dam.

"Below the dam, we have our own little mini-Niagara Falls. It's very soothing," he said. "Most evenings, there are 10 or 15 cars by the fishing wall with people just listening to the water and enjoying the evening."

Billionaires Pledge To Donate Half Their Wealth

SEATTLE — Forty wealthy families and individuals have joined Microsoft Corp. co-founder Bill Gates and billionaire investor Warren Buffett in a pledge to give at least half their wealth to charity.

Six weeks after launching a campaign to get other billionaires to donate most of their fortunes, the chairman and CEO of Berkshire Hathaway Inc. released the first list Wednesday of people who have signed what he and Gates call the "giving pledge."

Buffett decided in 2006 to give 99 percent of his fortune to charity. Then, he was worth about \$44 billion. After five years of investment returns while making annual gifts to five foundations, Buffett's fortune totals nearly \$46 billion.

Bill and Melinda Gates do most of their philanthropic giving through their foundation, which had assets of \$33 billion as of June 30 and has made at least \$22.93 billion in total grant commitments since 1994.

Buffett said he, the Gateses and others have made 70 to 80 calls to some of the nation's wealthiest individuals. The people who agreed to the pledge are from 13 states, with the most participants in California and New York.

Man Sues Paper Over Wrong I.D.

SIoux FALLS (AP) — A businessman who says his reputation suffered after the Sioux Falls *Argus Leader* incorrectly identified him as having been arrested following a domestic disturbance sued the newspaper Wednesday, alleging libel.

Rory Randal Kelly, 33, is part owner of Cellular Only in Sioux Falls. He said he received e-mails and text messages after the misidentification appeared on the newspaper's Web site July 14 and in print editions July 15. One major commercial client called his company to inquire about his alleged behavior, he said.

"I don't want Cellular Only to be affected by the mistake," said Kelly, whose voice is heard in Cellular Only advertising.

Police had initially identified the man arrested as Rory Randal Kelly, 33, but later corrected the ID to Rory Patrick Kelley, 24.

Kelly's attorney, former governor and congressman Bill Janklow, acknowledged Wednesday that the "first mistake was not the media's fault."

But he said the newspaper failed to run a correction for three days, allowing the damage to go on.

"It's sloppy, or it's deliberate or it's negligence," Janklow said. He said Kelly deserves to be compensated for the mistake.

A message seeking comment was left Wednesday afternoon for *Argus Leader* Publisher Randell Beck.

The incorrect brief listing Kelly as the person arrested remained available on the *Argus Leader's* Web site Wednesday.

\$11.3M Awarded To Expand Neb. Broadband

FALLS CITY, Neb. (AP) — Several thousand people in southeast Nebraska will benefit from an \$11.3 million USDA grant that will help pay for broadband Internet access.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced Wednesday that Southeast Nebraska Communications Inc. would receive the grant to install fiber optic lines for fast Internet service around Falls City. The Nebraska grant is one of 126 stimulus projects worth \$1.2 billion announced Wednesday.

Officials estimate that about 3,000 people will benefit from faster Internet connections because of the Nebraska project.

Nebraska U.S. Sen. Ben Nelson says having broadband Internet access in rural areas helps those areas better compete for economic development.
