Reservoir Storage Remains Above Normal

OMAHA, Neb. — Snow melt runoff, wet soil conditions and above-average precipitation continued throughout the Missouri River basin during the month of July. As a result, the reservoir system storage remains above normal.

The forecast for August anticipates more above-average runoff due to higher-than-normal soil moisture and average precipitation. If the forecast verifies, 2010 will be the third highest runoff season during the Corps' 113-year statistical record for the Missouri River basin.

Releases from Gavins Point Dam will increase from the current rate of 38,000 cubic feet per second to 47,500 cubic feet per second by late August. In order to evacuate all of the surplus water from the system in time for the start of next year's runoff season, the Corps will adjust releases out of the other system dams as well, with the exception of Fort Peck.

Increased releases out of Fort Randall may cause some lowland flooding to adjacent croplands and pastures within the reach between Fort Randall and Gavins Point Dam.

Gavins Point releases averaged 35,100 in July. The long-term average in July is 32,200 cfs. Releases will average 44,000 cfs in August.

Fort Randall releases averaged 31,700 cfs in July. They will average 41,900 cfs during August to help evacuate flood waters from the reservoir. Fort Randall is projected to decrease by about 5 feet in August, ending near elevation 1,358 feet.

Personal Watercraft On River Prohibited

The public is reminded that jet skis and other personal watercraft are prohibited on the Missouri National Recreational River. However, jet skiers and personal watercraft owners are welcome to use them on Lewis and Clark Lake, the reservoir section of the Missouri River located above the Gavins Point Dam that is managed by South Dakota Game, Fish, and Parks.

"Lately, we have been receiving multiple reports of jet skis being operated in the national park, the Missouri National Recreational River, particularly down river between Gavins Point Dam and Vermillion," says Acting Superintendent Gia Wagner. "This is of great concern to the National Park Service because we are responsible for protecting the River's outstandingly remarkable values as designated by the Wild and Scenic Rivers Act of 1968. These nationally significant characteristics include the natural and cultural history, scenery, fish, and wildlife, which includes three resident threatened and endangered species, the pallid sturgeon, piping plover, and least interior tern."

The 39-mile District of the Missouri National Recreational River extends from just below Fort Randall Dam down to Lewis and Clark Lake and the 59-mile District stretches from below Gavins Point Dam down to just south of Ponca State Park.

CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures were mixed Friday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for September delivery lost 60 cents to \$7.2575 a bushel, while September corn added 1.5 cents to \$4.05 a bushel and oats for September delivery fell 2.5 cents to \$2.795 a bushel. November soybeans rose 4.5 cents to \$10.335 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef futures fell and pork futures traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

October live cattle edged down 0.72 cent to 95.55 cents a pound; August feeder cattle slipped 0.3 cent to \$1.124 a pound; October lean hogs shed 1.95 cents to 74.07 cents a pound; and August pork bellies jumped 4.5 cents to \$1.23 a pound.
