## Take Precautions When Cleaning Up After Flood

PIERRE — South Dakotans involved in flood cleanup efforts from recent summer storms should be aware of possible hazards and take precautions to protect themselves, according to the state Department of Health.

- Scrub flooded indoor areas with warm soapy water, particularly food-contact surfaces (counter tops, pantry shelves, etc.) and areas where children play. Rinse with a solution of 1/2 cup (4 ounces) laundry bleach for each gallon of water.
- If there has been backflow of sewage into the house, remove and discard wall coverings, cloth, rugs, Sheetrock and other absorbent materials. Wear rubber boots and waterproof gloves during the cleanup. Clean and mop the area, treat with disinfectant and dehumidify.
- Be aware of chemical hazards such as solvents, aerosol cans and industrial chemicals the floodwaters might have moved from their normal storage place.
- Do not use gas- or diesel-powered pumps, generators or pressure washers inside as they release carbon monoxide, a deadly but colorless and odorless gas. It is virtually impossible to assure adequate ventilation.
- Because water supplies can be contaminated in flood conditions, take precautions to assure safe water for drinking and cooking. If there are concerns about the safety of drinking water, it can be boiled for three minutes after it has reached a rolling boil. Boiling should not be used unless the nitrate level in the water is low, as boiling concentrates nitrates.
- For infants, use ready to feed formula or bottled water for mixing formula. Water of drinking quality should be used for food preparation. Clean water should be available for frequent hand washing or bathing.
- Private water wells in flood areas should be pumped out and allowed to recharge naturally. They should then be disinfected and the water tested for bacteria and nitrates before drinking or being used for cooking.
