infections and two deaths nationwide through Aug. 3, slightly above the count of a year ago.
 "Nationwide, the picture is difficult to interpret because West Nile is local and sporadic," said Roger Nasci, chief of the CDC's Arboviral Diseases Branch in Fort Collins, Colo. "You can have hotspots in one location and not in another area."
 "In many parts of the country we've still got a lot of summer season left," he said.

In Sioux Falls and Aberdeen, where human West Nile infections have been confirmed, hundreds of vector mosquitoes are being counted in traps each night.
 "When we find 10 or more Culex species in our traps we consider that too many," said Denise Van Roekel, Health Program Coordinator for the city of Sioux Falls. "So when you find 200, obviously that's over the threshold."

Aberdeen has done two aerial applications of spray, more than a dozen ground applications, spot spraying and larviciding.
 "We've been out a lot, probably more than we've ever been that I can think of," said Hoven. "We're just trying to keep the numbers under control, and that's just because we have a lot of water."
 Hildreth said it appears the virus didn't get established in birds.
 "The natural question is, if it hasn't amplified by now, could it catch up later on?" Hildreth said. "The honest truth is I don't have the foggiest clue. But we do have some historical reasons why we think maybe it won't."
 Hildreth said it's doubtful the

number of infected humans and mosquito pools would suddenly shoot up.
 "It's not like the virus appears from nowhere. (Amplification) is a gradual time-dependent process."

The frequent and often heavy rain in places like Sioux Falls has complicated larviciding, an effective control measure in which chemicals are added to standing water to kill mosquito larva.
 "Any water that's there for a week or longer we want to treat it, but if it's going to be drained or evaporate within three or four days we don't want to use our resources treating it," Van Roekel said.

And with detention ponds, which you know are always there and are treated throughout the year, now all of a sudden our treatments are diluted because there's so much water. It's been a vicious cycle."

supposed to be there and then come back and deal with the damage."

A decision was made to close Highway 52 from West City Limits Road to Highway 50, as well as Crest Road and Toe Road, because so many onlookers were clogging the area and interfering with the transportation of emergency resources.

"We didn't want people getting in the way of responders who had a job to do," Rettig said. He added that officials wanted to avoid accidents caused by people looking at damage rather than paying attention to their driving.

Security was set up at the campground areas overnight to ensure that only authorized personnel gained access, according to Rettig.
 In all, two people were hospitalized with minor injuries in connection with the storm.

At least three families were being assisted by the Yankton County Red Cross due to their homes being damaged. Among the areas with damaged homes was Larson's Landing and Riverside Acres.

Also, Yankton Search and Rescue crews retrieved boats and at least one section of a dock that was floating down the Missouri River.

Emergency responders gathered at Yankton's north fire station at 8:30 p.m. Sunday night for a debriefing. Rettig said they were pleased overall with the response.

"What we discovered tonight was, Yankton County has a pretty good system in place to be able to handle this particular situation," he said. "One of the top concerns around here has always been a big storm that comes through and hits the campgrounds while they are full. Now we know we have a structure in place to be able to respond to an incident like this quickly."
 In the storm's aftermath, not only were officials from various

Yankton County and state agencies on the scene, but also responders from a wide swath of area communities, such as Lesterville, Tabor, Scotland, Tyndall, Springfield and Vermillion, were at the ready to provide assistance.

"At one point, we had to request that no more resources be sent because we had so many available," Rettig said. "It's great to have more resources than you need, and that was the situation tonight."

According to Bon Homme County Emergency Manager Jon Vavruska, between 2-4 inches of rain was reported in that county. In Tyndall, he said 3.40 inches fell and was accompanied by winds that reached well above 70 mph.

"We had a lot of trees uprooted in Tyndall," he said. "We had some farmsteads with extensive damage to sheds."

Additionally, a report was received of a camper and pickup that flipped at the intersection of Highway 37 and Highway 50.

No injuries were reported in connection to the storm, Vavruska said.

Just before 10 p.m. Sunday, he said power crews were still working to restore electricity to portions of the county.

In Cedar County (Neb.), there were reports of downed power lines in some areas. Cedar County Emergency Manager Kevin Garvin said winds of 48 mph were recorded in Hartington. Additionally, 1.28 inches of rain fell in the community.

The most severe damage occurred in the northwest section of the county, Garvin said. Members of the Cedar County Sheriff's Office and the two deputy directors of emergency management were in the Lewis and Clark Lake area to clean up the storm's aftermath at the campgrounds.
 In Knox County (Neb.), there was a report that 1.50 inches of rain had fallen approximately seven miles west of Crofton.

The Yankton area was expected to remain under a heat advisory today (Monday) as hot, humid conditions continue to dominate the region.
