School Board Moves To New Digs

The August meeting of the Yankton School Board will take place 5:30 p.m. Monday at the new Administration building located on West City Limits Drive. The meeting will be the first official use of the new board room open to the public.

During the meeting topics that will be discussed include amending the schools absenteeism policy and procedures, hearing a report on the district's student achievement test results, consider updating the districts strategic plan and hear updates on the school's website.

Sack Pack program is to provide weekend meals that are nutritious, shelf-stable and child-friendly so every child has a better chance of being successful in the classroom.

With the addition of Stewart, the group expects to be serving more than 325 students. That number is expected to exceed 400 by the end of the year.

"The financial support that the community has provided and the volunteers willing to be a part of this program have been wonderful," Schulte said. "(Group member) Deb Overseth has been overseeing the volunteers, and she said that last year we had more than 200 volunteers helping with the program."

The cost for providing the meals to each student is \$135 per school year. Administrative costs such as location for storing food stuffs, distribution, transportation, meal planning and fundraising are donated by the volunteers.

"We looked at the finances and decided that we could handle expanding," Schulte said. "We have also become affiliated with the United Way."

Because the group hopes to eventually be able to expand to every school in Yankton, Schulte said there are still needs the

community can help meet.

"We need continued awareness of the needs of the students," he said. "The percentage of students on free and reduced price lunches continues to increase. Further, we are seeing a lot of students who were on reduced (meals) moving to free meals."

Schulte says he hopes to see the community continue to volunteer and get hands-on with the program.

If interested in donating people should contact Overseth at 260-3100. If a person would like to make an anonymous donation they can go directly to First Dakota National bank and ask the donation to be placed in the group's account.

While the program has already made a difference for many children in the community, Schulte stressed that there are still many unmet needs.

"We are depending on the generosity of the community to ensure the continued success of the program," he said.

If you have a child who attends Webster, Lincoln or Stewart Elementary and are interested in learning more about the program, the group will have representatives at the schools' open houses on Wednesday, Aug. 18. Also, the principals of the schools will be sending out letters with students. The first meals will be sent home with students Friday, Sept. 10.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures were mixed Friday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for December delivery dropped 9.5 cents to \$7.3425 a bushel, while December corn gained 5.5 cents to \$4.2725 a bushel and oats for December delivery rose 1.5 cents to \$2.865 a bushel. November soybeans jumped 15.5 cents to \$10.44 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef and pork futures also traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

October live cattle was flat at \$5.3 cents a pound; October feeder cattle lost 0.87 cent to \$1.114 a pound; October lean hogs inched up 0.03 cent to 74.65 cents a pound; and August pork bellies fell 0.5 cent to \$1.40 a pound.
