**Hearing Officer**  
**Rules For Pierre In**  
**Labor Dispute**

PIERRE (AP) — A state hearing officer has sided with the city of Pierre in a labor dispute.

James Marsh, director of the state Department of Labor's Division of Labor and Management, agreed with the city on five contract issues.

The International Union of Operating Engineers, Local 49, and the city have been negotiating a new contract for more than a year without an agreement. The union represents the city's civilian employees and workers in the police department who aren't officers.

Employees in the city's electrical department have their own union.

In April, the city commission decided to impose its final salary offer, which provides a 1 percent raise for all employees and another 1 percent for eligible workers. The union appealed.

**Neb. Man Faces**  
**Trial In Bathtub**  
**Drowning In Iowa**

SIOUX CITY, Iowa (AP) — A Nebraska man has been ordered to stand trial in the drowning death of his 13-month-old child in a bathtub in Iowa.

Court documents filed in Woodbury County District Court show 22-year-old Selvin Arevalo-Morga, of Omaha, has pleaded not guilty to child endangerment causing death and neglect. He's being held in the county jail on \$25,000 bond.

A trial has been set for Sept. 7. He faces up to 60 years in prison if convicted.

Court documents says Arevalo-Morga left his 13-month-old in the bathtub with a 3-year-old in May 2009, then left the bathroom to eat dinner.

**Legends Ride**  
**Through S.D. Raises**  
**\$52K For Charities**

DEADWOOD (AP) — The celebrity-studded Legends Ride through Deadwood to Sturgis has raised more than \$52,000 for charity.

Proceeds from last Monday's motorcycle ride go to the Sky Ranch for Boys and the Sturgis Motorcycle Hall of Fame and Museum. The cost to participate was \$150.

The Deadwood Chamber of Commerce, the event's sponsor, says actors Paul Reubens and Lorenzo Lamas and "Survivor" star Rupert Boneham participated in the 50-mile ride, which coincided with the start of the 70th annual Sturgis Motorcycle Rally.

The chamber says the annual event has raised \$150,000 for charity since it was started three years ago.

**Mitchell Chamber**  
**Urges New Corn**  
**Palace In 20 Years**

MITCHELL (AP) — The city of Mitchell should consider replacing its nearly 90-year-old Corn Palace within the next 20 years or risk a further dip in visitors, according to a new report from the city's chamber of commerce.

The report, prepared by a chamber subcommittee, says the current arena is showing its age and a new, larger one is needed to preserve Mitchell's history as a tourist destination.

"People continue to want and like to travel. However, their tastes have changed as today they don't just want to 'see' places, they want to 'experience' the destination, which creates a unique personal memory they can cherish forever. While traveler tastes have changed over the years, the current Corn Palace has not adapted to meet their expectations," the report said.

The Corn Palace is known for its colorful exterior murals, which are redesigned each year out of corn and other grains.

The first Corn Palace debuted in 1892. The current one — the third in the series —

was built in 1921.

Doug Dailey, president of the Mitchell Area Chamber of Commerce's board of directors, says he'd like to see the current Corn Palace retired after its 100th anniversary.

He says a new, larger Corn Palace could reverse the attraction's dip in visitors and bring in more revenue for the community.

The Corn Palace saw about 270,000 visitors during its 2009 season, which runs from May to early October, according to the report. That's a drop of 150,000 to 200,000 visitors from the attraction's peak years in the late 1970s and early '80s.

That dip in attendance has meant less revenue for the Mitchell. The report says it costs \$936,000 to run the Corn Palace for a year, but it takes in \$658,000 in revenue.

The report, prepared by a chamber subcommittee, requests the city spend \$34,000 on designs for a new Corn Palace.

**Lincoln-Based Ornithologist**  
**Featured Crane Festival Speaker**

FAIRBANKS, Alaska — Ornithologist, author, photographer and artist Paul Johnsgard has had a long relationship with Alaska and its birds, even though he lives in Lincoln, Neb.

His most recent visit was in 2004 when he visited the Sandhill Crane Festival as the featured speaker, as he will be doing again next weekend (Aug. 20-22). But he also visited in the 1960s, doing research on birds living on the tundra.

A professor emeritus of biological sciences at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, where he taught for 40 years, Johnsgard, 79, has been authoring books for the last 60. In that time he's published 43 books and contributed sketches or photography to most of them.

Johnsgard will have three presentations at the crane festival. The first is at 10:30 p.m. Friday at the Creamer's Field Farmhouse with another at 7 p.m. Saturday at the Wedgewood Resort's Taiga Center. He will also lead a workshop at 1 p.m. Saturday on "Writing and Illustrating Stories about Wildlife and Nature."

Melissa Sikes, Friends of Creamer's Field program director,

said that every year the crane festival tries to have a different featured bird specialists from a variety of different backgrounds: artists, photographers, scientists. Johnsgard is unique in that he fits all of those things.

Johnsgard's career started with more academic writing, but later he started making forays into "semi-popular" books with the 1981 publishing of "Song of the North Wind: A Story of the Snow Goose," which was eventually translated into three languages. Instead of writing about them from an academic point of view, he told the story in a more narrative style, through the perspective of the geese.

A few years later he wrote "Those of the Gray Wind: The Sandhill Cranes," using the same storytelling technique but this time focusing on sandhill cranes. It was well received, eventually translated into Chinese, and developed into a documentary film.
