year before pedestrians and bicyclists will be allowed to use the bridge.

Once the conversion is complete, the City of Yankton will take over day-to-day maintenance on the structure.

Plans are under way to build a recreational trail on the Nebraska side that would connect the bridge to Gavins Point Dam and the Lewis and Clark Visitors Center along Highway 81. The trail would also tie in with trails already existing on the South Dakota side of the Missouri River.

Sandblasting and spot painting has begun on important joints of the Meridian Bridge to prevent deterioration, and the gray contrasts sharply with the rust that has crept across much of the structure. Painting of the entire bridge will not be done as part of the project because of the large cost associated with such an undertaking.

"The bridge was put up in the early 1920s," Wentzlaff said. "There's bound to be a lot of rust."

And rust can be a powerful force. He points to a metal plate that has been bowed out by the rust collecting between it and another plate.

"Don't let anybody kid you," Wentzlaff said. "Rust has a lot of

power to bend metal like that." Much of the work being done on the bridge involves reinforcing 36 interior and exterior gusset plates that have deteriorated over time. The majority of those are on the spans closest to the Nebraska and South Dakota shores.

Why is that, the reporter asked.

"Your guess is as good as mine," Wentzlaff replies.

In order to reinforce the gusset plates, plexiglass is placed over them. Marks are made to denote the position of each rivet in the plate. Then, the plexiglass is placed over a new gusset plate, and holes are drilled in it. Finally, the new gusset plate is fitted over the existing one.

The canvas that is occasionally used to contain portions of the bridge creates an environment where the lead paint being sandblasted off the gusset plates and beams can be captured.

Black diamond is used during the process, and it is mixed with a powder similar to Portland cement that encapsulates the lead. Wentzlaff said tests have shown the lead content is very low, but precautions must be taken anyway to properly dispose of it.

"When they do the blasting, all the sand and the lead from the paint lands on the Safespan platform and is vacuumed up," he said.

A large vacuum sits on the bottom deck of the bridge with a four-inch hose that is used to suck up the debris.

City To Consider Ribfest Parking Request

The Yankton City Commission will consider a request Monday from Ribfest organizers to prohibit parking in portions of the downtown area in the hours before the September event.
