Rally Time: Motorists, Bikers Urged To Share Road Safely

PIERRE — The arrival of August means the annual Sturgis Motorcycle Rally is at hand, and the South Dakota Highway Patrol is reminding bikers and motorists to use extra care as they share the road.

Last year, South Dakota recorded 27 fatal accidents involving motorcycles. More than one-third of those fatal crashes occurred in West River counties during what is generally considered "Rally Time" in South Dakota. That's the roughly two-week period starting the first week of August.

"When the rally approaches, we see increased bike traffic mixing with the already heavy summer motorist travel," said Sgt. Rick Miller of the South Dakota Highway Patrol's Rapid City division. "Bikers and motorists can

increase their chances of traveling safely if they make an extra effort to be aware of each other and to respect each other's presence on the road."

State Office of accident records reports from the first two weeks in August in West River counties show 11 fatal motorcycle crashes in 2005, eight in 2006, five in 2007, two in 2008, one in 2009 and 10 in 2010.

The Highway Patrol is reminding motorcycle riders and motorists alike of the rules for sharing the road:

- Motorcyclists should ride in single-file lines and avoid crowding the center line or crowding motorists.
- Motorists should remember not to crowd cycles. Motorcycles have the same rights on the road as motorists.

- Motorists and cyclists should follow the recommended speed limits. Motorcyclists should be especially aware of speed limits on curves.
- It is against the law to drink and drive. Motorists and cyclists should make sure they have sober drivers.
- Motorists should remember to buckle up. It's the law.
- Motorcyclists are encouraged to wear helmets.

"And, please don't forget that as fun as motorcycles are, you're very vulnerable if you're riding one," Miller said. "The best protection for anyone on a motorcycle is a helmet."

The official dates of the 2011 Sturgis Motorcycle Rally are Monday, Aug. 8 through Sunday, Aug. 14.

bigger bins," Haak said.

Jan Odens of Yankton Ag added, "The more local personnel trained in that type of rescue, the better."

The coffer dam used for grain rescues comes in six interlocking pieces that are about five feet tall. It forms a circle and is pushed down around the victim. At that point, a vacuum can be used to suck grain away from the victim, or the grain can be scooped out.

Nickles said the course included about three hours of classroom instruction on the dangers of grain.

"When we were done, we went out and did the actual hands-on work," he added. "A special thanks goes out to Yankton Ag Service for allowing us to use their facility."

During the exercise, a firefighter was buried chest-high in corn.

"They got a feeling for what the victim would experience," Nickles said. "The rescuers would go in and start setting the tube. A grain vacuum was used to get the grain out of the tube. Then, using steps inside the tube, the victims were able to walk their way out."

There are several general ways that grain can be

dangerous. Moving grain can act like quicksand and bury an individual. Another example is when "bridging" occurs. In this instance, moisture or mold causes the grain to clump together and leave an empty space beneath it. Someone standing on top of or below the bridge can be buried when it collapses. Finally, someone standing next to a steep pile of grain can be buried if it collapses.

If an individual is covered in grain, it is possible to survive the incident, Nickles said.

"If they can keep an air space, whether it is using a mask, or

getting an arm in front of them or anything else to keep the grain from their mouth or nose, there is a really good survival rate — provided someone knows you're missing," he said. People have survived more than five hours while entrapped in grain, according to Nickles.

He stated that the grain entrapment rescue equipment will be stored on the department's rescue truck.

"We've still got some training to do," he said. "But the big thing was getting that tube bought."
