assessment notices," said chairman Gillas Stern.

State's Attorney Glenn Roth said he recommended to the commissioners that they send a letter to postal officials and South Dakota's congressional delegation.

"With the volume of mail that comes in and out of the offices from the courthouse, it's important to have the availability of the mail service," he said. "People pay taxes, send documents and title their car. We need to have the services available for the public's sake. We need to be aggressive."

At Tuesday's meeting, the commissioners said they were asked about a petition effort to keep open the Olivet post office similar to one undertaken for Dimock.

However, those petitions would not go through the county and are different than the commissioners' letter of support, Simonsen said.

As part of the closure process, the Postal Service will hold a community meeting and ask the public to fill out a survey, Schoenfish said.

"It's important to get people's opinions," she said. "The regulations have changed, so the (closure) process is much faster. There was a moratorium on closures, but that was lifted because of the (USPS) terrible financial problems."

A sampling of courthouse employees say they use the Olivet post office in a variety of ways.

- Sheriff Jim Zeeb said his department would be forced to drive to Menno or another neighboring post office, leaving the office unattended at times and creating additional mileage expense.
- Not all business can be conducted by email, and the sheriff's department relies on the easy access to the Olivet post office, Zeeb said.
- "We use the post office to send bills to people for our civil process fee," he said. "We also send evidence to Pierre. We send blood for (drunken-driving) arrests, and we get a lot of supplies by mail."
- Some documents must be mailed, Zeeb said. "Sometimes it has to be the original and can't be faxed. The clerk of courts also sends out certified mail," he said.
- In addition, Game, Fish and Parks rents a mailbox at the post office, Zeeb said.
- "This affects everybody in the courthouse," he said. "There isn't an office that doesn't use the post office at least now and then. It would be hard for the courthouse to function without a post office."
- Treasurer Tamara Miller mails out 4,000 tax notices annually. Last year, the treasurer's office sold and renewed 12,676 vehicle licenses with many of them mailed to residents.
- The treasurer's office uses the Olivet post office not only for its regular mail but also for registered and certified mail. In addition, the availability of a local post office allows for a quick turnaround with same-day mailing of notices and licenses.
- Tony Dewald, the director of equalization, said he uses the Olivet post office for mass mailings and for sending oversized and other specialized documents.
- Extension educator Deanna Gall sends fair books and other information, but she has also sent one colorful item.
- "The Power People 4-H Club of Menno collected crayons from the Freeman and Menno daycares and schools," she said. "The crayons were sent to a company that melts down the crayons. We sent 60 pounds of it."
- Gall commended Schoenfish's customer service and said some arrangement will need to be made if the Olivet post office closes.
- "Somebody will have to run over to Menno, or they will need to have somebody come here (to Olivet)," Gall said.
- At Tuesday's meeting, the commissioners said they support keeping open the Olivet post office. However, they are also prepared for what happens if the effort fails. They talked about negotiating with postal officials to keep some services.
- County Commissioner Glenn Harnisch said the proposed postal closures likely represent the way of the future.
- "Unfortunately, the budget cuts require less service. We may have to deal with these things in our rural communities," he said. "Nobody wants any of these (closures) to happen, but we have to be realistic."
- "Everybody wants government to spend less and be the most efficient. If that means closing post offices, then we have to deal with that."

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures jumped Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade after the U.S. Agriculture Department said hot weather in several of the country's biggest farm states was stressing crops. A smaller crop could drive up prices.

Wheat for September delivery soared 41.5 cents to \$7.18 a bushel; December corn shot up 30 cents to \$7.1575 a bushel; December oats rose 7 cents to \$3.65 a bushel, while November soybeans climbed 17.75 cents to \$13.7975 a bushel.

Meanwhile, beef and pork futures traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

October live cattle rose 0.25 cent to \$1.1805 a pound; September feeder cattle slid 2.12 cents to \$1.3660 a pound; and October lean hogs shed 0.33 cent to 92.67 cents a pound.
