Tuesday Accident Victim Identified

An Iowa man has been identified as the victim in a fatal Tuesday motorcycle accident near Gavins Point Dam.

Hunter Heidesch, 20, of Marcus, Iowa, was killed when he lost control of his motorcycle on Pow-erhouse Road near the dam on Nebraska Highway 121, according to a press release issued Wednesday morning by the Cedar County Sheriff's Office.

According to Yankton Deputy Fire Chief Larry Nickles, it is believed Heidesch lost control of his motorcycle while rounding a bend in the road and was ejected

at approximately 4:34 p.m. Tuesday. In the process, he lost his helmet and struck an oncoming pickup. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

A second motorcyclist also lost control of his vehicle during the incident but had only minor injuries.

Two occupants were in the pickup, which had no damage.

Besides the Cedar County Sheriff's Department, Yankton County EMS and the Yankton Fire Department also responded to the incident. Personnel from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers also lent assistance.

RTEC, SEJL Receive Grant For New Computer Lab

Officials at the Regional Technical Education Center (RTEC) and Southeast Job Link (SEJL), two local non-profit organizations, have announced they were chosen to receive a \$12,000 grant from the Otto Ullrich Memorial Trust.

The grant funds will be utilized to enhance course offerings at both organizations by allowing them to purchase new computers for a shared multipurpose lab. RTEC currently has the software to offer Computer Aided Drafting (CAD) courses such as Solidworks, Pro Engineer, Mastercam and Chief Architect. Southeast Job Link offers Adobe Creative Suite programs, Web page design and Microsoft Office courses.

The addition of new computers will allow both non-profits to keep up with changing technology and ensure they have machines capable of running the necessary software applications. That will provide students enrolled in RTEC and Southeast Job Link courses as well as those of offered on-site by Black Hills State University and Mitchell Technical Institute increased learning possibilities.

"We owe a huge thanks to the

Otto Ullrich Memorial Trust," said Josh Svatos, General Manager of RTEC. "This is a great opportunity for RTEC and Southeast Job Link. We will now be able to provide Yankton and surrounding counties with additional cutting-edge computer training in a top-notch computer lab."

Sheri Duke, executive director of Southeast Job Link, agrees, adding that the grant couldn't have arrived at a better time.

"This grant opportunity arose at a time when funding sources for education and labor are getting cut across the nation," Duke said. "In order to keep up with the changing educational needs of our students, employers and employees in the region, it was imperative that our equipment be updated to meet these demands

so we can continue to educate and train our workforce and student population. Now we can do that."

Both Duke and Svatos believe that the partnership between Southeast Job Link and RTEC in applying for and receiving the grant will allow them to improve the learning experience for all of their students. It also strengthens the relationship between the two organizations which are both located at 1200 W. 21st St. They hope the new multipurpose lab will be ready for use this fall.
