comparable size and the many persons residing in that area who will find this lake an ideal and convenient place for recreation.”

Fuks said, “The lake continues to be the number one attraction in this region because of the number of people who come mainly from Nebraska, Iowa and South Dakota. It’s a great getaway that is not far away. (Gavins Point Dam) is an attraction now because of the historic water,” she continued. “But clear back in 1952, it was a huge attraction because they were building it. Prior to that, it was history related to Jack McCall or Custer or historic homes.”

Lisa Scheve, the director of the

Yankton Convention and Visitors Bureau, said her office spends about 75 percent of its time marketing the Yankton area to leisure tourists, many of whom visit Lewis and Clark Lake.

“A lot of them are getting away for a weekend,” she said. “But they’re interested in history. The Lewis and Clark expedition is always a very popular topic.”

Of course, the way in which the Yankton area is marketed has evolved through the decades. Instead of calling the Convention and Visitors Bureau to request promotional materials, potential visitors now often peruse the area’s attractions via the Internet.

“The way we market to visitors has totally changed,” Scheve said. “Everything used to be very print-oriented, and you could track things by how many visitor requests you received. That’s still a big part of

what we do, but people are obtaining information about our community differently.”

As Fuks puts it, “When I first started 13 years ago, it was nice to have a website. Now, you can’t do business without it.”

She also points out that Southeast South Dakotan Tourism was created about 25 years ago as communities realized they needed to pool together their resources when it comes to self-promotion.

“The dollars aren’t there to compete with Disney Land, so we were created to work together,” she said. “It makes a lot more sense.”

Potential areas for future visitor growth in the region are agritourism and ecotourism, according to Fuks. As more and more people leave the rural landscape to live in metropolitan areas, many have a recreational interest in experiencing life on a farm or other adventures with nature.

Also, a tough economy has so far proven to be advantageous for southeast South Dakota, Fuks said.

“Surprisingly, when gas prices get around \$4, this region benefits,” she said. “We see more tourism, because people aren’t going clear across the state to the Black Hills. They are looking for something closer.”

Whatever the future holds, Fuks said that the area’s history will continue to play an important role in tourism. As residents have seen this summer, sometimes even the present can be historic.

“Who knew that the dams in North Dakota and South Dakota would create an attraction?” she asked. “People are following the dams all the way up the Missouri River. I had one guy tell me that he wanted to be able to tell his grandkids that he was there and saw it.”

NorthWestern Energy Again Surpasses Its Demand Record

HURON (AP) — NorthWestern Energy says intense heat and humidity has led to it set a new all-time record for electricity demand, just two weeks after breaking one that held for four years.

The *Huron Plainsman* says cooling equipment and other electric demands on Monday pushed the South Dakota electric utility system to a new peak of 341 megawatts.

Just two weeks ago, NorthWestern set a record of 338 megawatts, breaking the previous one of 315 megawatts set in 2007.

NorthWestern Energy’s Dennis Wagner says nobody at NorthWestern thought it’d break the July 18 record so soon, but it shows the amount of energy a cooling system requires to keep up with temperatures in the 100s and heavy humidity.

USDA Reports Higher Nebraska Farm, Ranch Expenses

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Federal authorities say Nebraska’s farmers and ranchers spent a total of nearly \$16 billion for production last year — 4 percent more than in 2009.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture says livestock expenses hit \$3.7 billion, an increase of 17 percent from 2009. Rent expenses rose to \$1.93 billion, 14 percent higher than in 2009.

The USDA says the expense categories with the highest increases were: other farm machinery, 23 percent higher than in 2009; and tractors and self-propelled machinery, 21 percent higher.

The USDA says the results are based on data from Nebraska farmers and ranchers to took part in the USDA’s Agricultural Resource Management Study.
