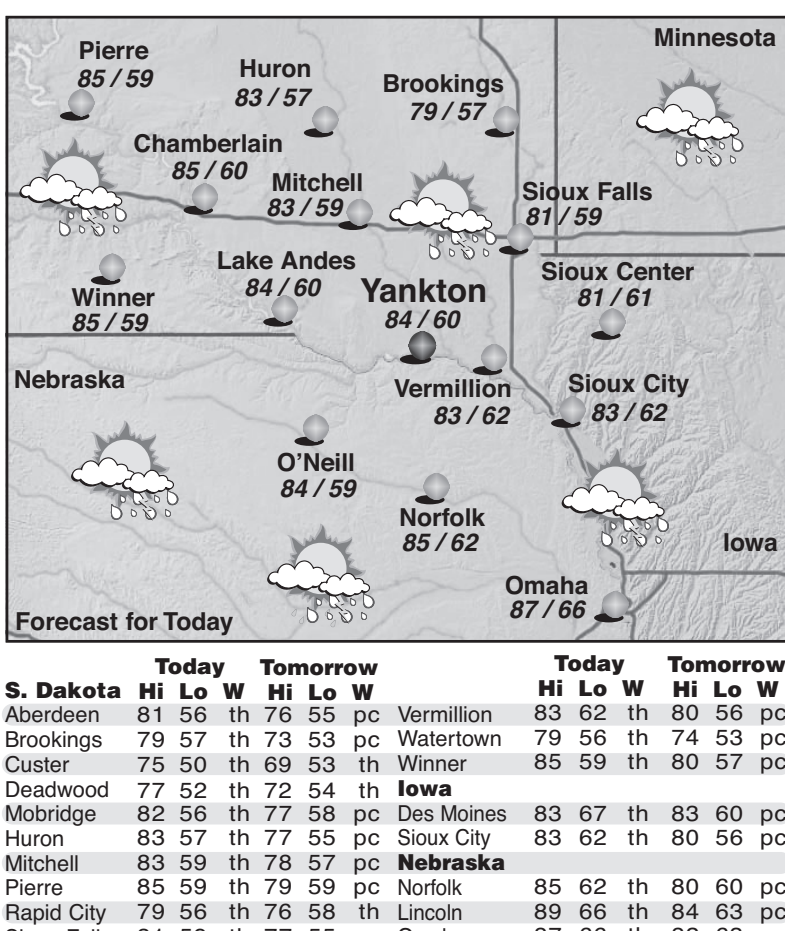

Social Security Office To Begin Closing Earlier

Effective Aug. 15, the Yankton Social Security office will be open to the public Monday through Friday from 9 a.m.-3:30 p.m., a reduction of 30 minutes each weekday. While agency employees will continue to work their regular hours, this shorter public window will allow them to complete face-to-face service with the visiting public without incurring the cost of overtime. Congress provided Social Security with nearly \$1 billion less than the president requested for the budget this fiscal year, which makes it impossible for the agency to provide the amount of overtime needed to handle service to the public as we have in the past. Most Social Security services do not require a visit to an office. For example, anyone wishing to apply for benefits, sign up for direct deposit, replace a Medicare card, obtain a proof of income letter or inform us of a change of address or telephone number may do so at www.socialsecurity.gov or by dialing our toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213. People who are deaf or hard of hearing may call our TTY number, 1-800-325-0778.

the reserve champion for senior showmanship.

A six-year 4-Her, Mogck noted his daily ritual for Achievement Days begins with washing his livestock at 6 a.m. and making sure they are groomed.

The judges ask for a cow's weight and look to see if the entry is muscular and stands right, Heine said.

This year, Heine took home one purple ribbon and one blue ribbon for market steers.

"I got a purple ribbon, but I won't be able to go to the state fair," he said. "I'm going to a wedding that weekend and won't be able to show (in Huron)."

While the beef barn was busy, the sheep show also drew interest.

One sheep showed restlessness, even rising on its hind legs while the competitor worked to bring the animal under control.

"This (sheep) isn't one to cooperate, but it's a real nice entry," the judge said. "This is an excellent class."

Lexy Maier, 8, of Gayville belongs to the Clever Clover 4-H Club. On this day, she was a spectator, walking the pens and drawing affection from sheep who nuzzled against her.

Maier said she looks forward to moving from the Cloverbuds program into 4-H competition next year. "It's nice to show stuff and tell it to judges," she said.

It was all business for Clever Clovers member Zach Roesler of Gayville, as he worked to get his sheep through the pens and into the show ring.

Roesler showed lambs in both 4-H and open class, and he was the overall grand champion in open class, according to his mother, Beth Roesler.

Beth Roesler said her husband, Max, comes from a 4-H background, and they have two younger boys — Mason, 6, and Jackson, 2 — who may join Zach in 4-H. Mason currently participates in the Cloverbuds program for those who are too young for 4-H competition.

Zach's sheep success runs in the family, as Beth's brother,

Brian Fairley, raises the critters. Zach usually spends an hour a day working with sheep, Beth said.

Achievement Days carries a hectic schedule, particularly when working with livestock, Beth said.

"It's a hot day, and the kids are getting tired," she said. "But the fans are going good (in the arena) and Zach has had a good Achievement Days."

The live-stock arena and barns weren't the only active places during Achievement Days. The horse ring was also busy Sunday as the Saddle Up 4-H Club presented a demonstration for fairgoers. Herman and Sandy Herrlein worked with the show while their daughter, Danielle, performed in the ring. Two clubs joined together to create Saddle Up, and the result has been an even stronger program for the dozen members, Sandy said.

"It's neat to see the kids come together. You have more interaction among them," she said. "They learn more about managing their horses, and they learn more about 4-H values like leadership."

The contests also provide a challenge, Sandy said. At the county and state level, entrants receive a pattern just before the show and must memorize and perform it, she said.

Jade Gaukel was riding a quarter-horse on Sunday and competes in the senior division. The 16-year-old, a junior at Yankton High School this fall, said she learned a great deal about horsemanship from her mother, Heidi Gaukel.

"My mom rode a horse since she was a little girl, and now she is a 4-H leader working with us," Jade said.

Heidi said she has worked with horses her entire life. "This (leadership role) is a great opportunity to take my life experiences and give back to 4-H," she said.

Jade said she works with her horse every day, usually taking Sundays off. She finished fourth at

the state level and wants to compete in equestrian at the college level.

What's the most important thing to know about horses?

"It's all about how you connect with them," Jade said. "Things like soccer and basketball are team sports with people, and horseback is a team with you and the animal."

Sunday's demonstration provided an important opportunity

for Yankton County's 4-H horse program, Sandy Herrlein said. "We had the county horse show in Yankton during the third week of June and the state horse show in Huron during the third week in July," she said.

"It's really important that they get the chance to show what they can do during Achievement Days. Here, people get to see the kids with their horses. This takes the horse show to a higher level."

While the horses and livestock drew crowds, one of the most popular animal exhibits wasn't found in the ring. Seventeen-year-old Andrew Adam won "Best of Show" in visual arts for his "European mounted" deer skull. The Happy Go Lucky 4-H Club member will be a senior this fall at Yankton High School.

Andrew and his father, Roland Adam, were hunting Thanksgiving morning 2009 when they came upon the deer.

"We were hunting in Gregory County on the last weekend of deer season for shooting buck,"

Andrew said. "We were supposed to be back at noon for Thanksgiving dinner. My dad unloaded his gun, but I kept mine out (in the open) just in case we saw something."

Andrew's instincts were right on target, and so was his shot.

"We saw a deer a half-mile away. Andrew needed to take only one shot," Roland said.

Andrew didn't think he had hit the deer, which went into the trees. "We thought we lost him, but he only got about 10 yards (and then dropped). We dragged the deer about a half-mile," he said.

He kept the deer skull and decided to turn it into art for this year's Achievement Days after seeing a taxidermist had used metal casting on a skull.

"I had to boil (my deer skull) in hot water to get the hide off, then I used Clorox on it," he said. "I sanded off the rough places, then sprayed (the skull) with bronze paint."

Roland said he was pleasantly surprised at his son's "Best of Show" award for visual arts.

"I told (Andrew) I didn't think it would win anything, that it wasn't worth entering," Roland said, looking at the top ribbon and indicating he was glad to be wrong.

Andrew said he planned to keep his prize-winning entry close to home and not risk any damage to it.

Regardless of the project, it's the 4-Hers' effort that makes them real winners, Beth Roesler said.

"It's all a matter of how much the kids work and the time they put into it," she said. "We try to emphasize that you should have fun and do well."

Cody List agreed, noting the rewards are worth all the hard work. "It all pays off in the end," he said.
