LONG POND, Pa. (AP) — Brad Keselowski was inspired Sunday by a relative in the Navy Seals, and that was all he needed to push through his painful ankle injury. Keselowski's cousin lost a friend who was one of 30 American service members who died when their helicopter was shot down during fighting in eastern Afghanistan. The NASCAR driver took the sacrifice to heart, and

vowed he would not leave his car no matter how bad he hurt. So Keselowski went out and raced all 500 miles of the Sprint Cup stop at Pocono Raceway with a broken left ankle. As if that wasn't enough, he somehow managed to win, too.

good putts when I needed to, my short game was as good as it's been in a long time."

It was the second first-place finish on the Dakotas Tour for Esler, after winning the one-day Olive Grove event. With another win under his belt, Esler said he just wants to keep improving.

"I'll learn from this - it's a huge confidence boost and I'll definitely learn from it," Esler said. "It was hard, the hardest round of golf I've ever played, one of the uglier rounds I've ever played, but it just happened that things went my way."

Last week, Brown played in his first Dakotas Tour event of the summer and finished in fourth place. Coming out strong again this weekend, Brown credited it to the atmosphere.

"I play really well up here. It just feels like home, I have a really fun week," Brown said, as he's close with his host family and even used their golf cart for the tournament. "I'm always re-

ally calm here. It's just a really comfortable place for me and the golf course really fits me - I got second here last year, too."

Starting the day in third, Brown knew he had to make a move early and was able to do so, overtaking Herron by the fourth hole.

"I got off to a really good start - I was making putts, hitting really good chip shots and good drives," he said.

On the back nine, Brown struggled to make putts and added two bogeys to his scorecard, one of which was on Hole 14, but Brown didn't let that affect him as he finished 15 with a birdie and one of his best plays.

Tearing off, Brown drilled his ball down the fairway, but when he got up to it he realized a power line was right in his way.

"I was bummed because if the power line wasn't there, I had a clear shot to the green and I was just going to go right at it. I aimed out way left, hit like a 50, 60 yard cut and it just came off perfect," he said.

Despite the tough situation, Brown landed his second shot right in front of the green for an easy chip and finished with the birdie.

"That was the best shot of the day," Brown said. "It was fun seeing the people in the carts behind me because they couldn't believe it, it's fun hearing people enjoy shots."

The players commended Hillcrest on its staff and keeping the leader board updated after every hole so they knew where other players stood.

Passing Herron early, Brown could focus on getting closer to Esler on the later holes, but then there were Ailes and Persons he had to watch out for.

"I saw people making moves, but it was good having (the leader board) there because on 18 I knew I needed a birdie, at least, to try to get second," Brown said. "It's good to know where people are at, but it's not good to just stare at it constantly."

Ailes is currently the bonus pool leader for the Dakotas Tour, with 278 points after his second place finish at Hillcrest.

The Dakotas Tour continues Thursday at the Arrowhead Country Club in Rapid City. Esler, Ailes and Brown will all play in the three-day event.

Dell Rapids pitcher Dale Solberg settled down after the first inning, retiring 10 straight before Friedel's one-out single in the top of the fifth. Singles by Jason Rasmussen, Kendall and Schreiber followed — the last two each driving in a run — as Vermillion regained the lead.

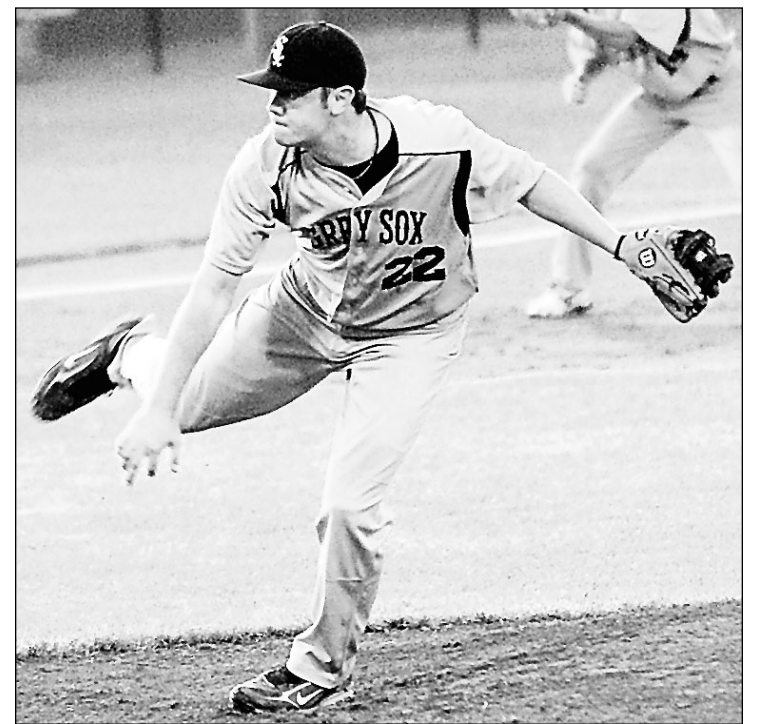
Schreiber overcame another wild inning in the bottom of the fifth. Conrad led off with a single, and Krull and Sheldon Davis drew walks, but an easy ground ball to short ended the threat.

A big one-out catch by Reid Meierkort in center field proved a big play in that inning. "Meierkort caught that ball about 400 feet from home plate," Lee noted. "That could have been a big change in momentum."

The Grey Sox responded to the big stop by opening the floodgates. A six-hit inning chased both Solberg and reliever Deon Entringer as Vermillion scored six runs to take a 9-2 lead. Kendall had a three-run homer, Schreiber doubled and Meierkort had a RBI single in the frame.

"We were able to play a lot more loose after that," Lee noted. PBR got a run back in the bottom of the sixth on a single by Landon Klock, a former Mount Marty standout. In the eighth, Dell Rapids finally got to Schreiber, then continued to hit as Kendall came on in relief, scoring twice to pull with four, 9-5. But the Grey Sox again dodged a bullet, leaving the bases loaded.

Klock, the third PBR pitcher, had retired nine straight before hitting Josh Gross with two outs in the ninth. The Grey Sox responded, drawing a walk before RBI singles by Joe Millar, Friedel and Ras-

mussen stretched the Vermillion lead back to seven, 12-5.

Those runs proved necessary, as PBR recorded four hits — three for extra-bases — in the bottom of the ninth to score three runs. A diving play by Tyler Johnson and a scoop by Schreiber at first base on the other end stopped the rally and ended PBR's season.

Rasmussen, a Legion pickup player, and Kendall had three hits each for Vermillion. Schreiber and Friedel had two hits each.

Scott LeBrun, Michael Davis, Conrad, Klock and Krull — the top five in the Dell Rapids order — each had two hits for PBR. The bottom four spots in the batting order combined to go 0-14 with six walks.

"We knew PBR had a bunch of good hitters," said Schreiber, who picked up the win to improve to 6-0 on the season. "We knew if we threw them a fastball, they would hit the fastball."

"Once I settled in, I wasn't able to blow it by anybody, but I was able to get outs. I couldn't ask for more."

The youthful Grey Sox defense also played a key role, Lee said. "Our youthful legs got to a lot of balls," he said.

Schreiber finished with 10

walks, but just four hits allowed and four earned runs, for the win. He struck out four. Kendall allowed four runs in his two innings of work.

"Their pitcher was wild enough that it kept us off balance," said Bentz, the PBR manager. "He was pretty effectively wild. It just wasn't our night."

Solberg allowed the first six runs — four earned — to take the loss.

"He didn't have his good stuff tonight, but he battled," said Bentz. "That's the way baseball goes sometimes." The Grey Sox (9-8) now advance to face the Parkston Mudcats, 11-inning winners over Madison earlier Saturday. Like Vermillion, Parkston is a younger team built on several players who had Legion baseball success a few years ago.

"We have nothing to lose," Schreiber said. "I don't think anybody but us and our fans expected us to win tonight. We're going to come in with a little swagger and play with nothing to lose."

"We're just gonna have fun." The Grey Sox-Parkston matchup is set for 6 p.m. Wednesday at Cadwell Park.
