total of probably 1,000 to 1,500 feet (of highway) under water."

The NDOR has been in contact with the Nebraska Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) and Knox County emergency manager Laura Hintz, Domogalla said.

"We have been trying to figure out any kind of temporary or intermediate work that we could do there," he said. "We have been in contact with the Army Corps (of

Engineers) and the National Park Service, getting permits for some of the materials that need to be put in there."

Meanwhile, the Corps of Engineers announced this week that upstream Fort Randall Dam releases at Pickstown will remain at 146,000 to 147,000 cubic feet per second (cfs). The reservoir continues falling 3/10 to 4/10 foot per day.

The downstream Gavins Point Dam releases at Yankton will remain at 150,000 cfs for an additional three days, until Aug. 18, according to Jody Farhat, chief of the Missouri River basin water management office in Omaha.

"If we want low releases in the fall and winter, it's important that we continue to evacuate water and get the proper amount of storage next month," she said. "Otherwise, we are shifting from fall to winter with more risk."

The higher runoff in July and August has put the Corps behind schedule, Farhat said.

"That combination, and the additional rain that we continue to get, leads us to think we continue to run further and further behind without these adjustments," she said.

The 150,000 cfs level provides a logical place for moving more water, Farhat said.

jects that have been on exhibit too long will rotate into storage for a while, and the things that people have never seen will come out," Schindel said. "I also see the opportunity to do a complete inventory and get the cataloging and records to a professional level. That needs to be done regularly. The big push is to get it done before the move, so that you have an inventory and know what you're moving."

The report was made possible by grant from Heritage Preservation's Conservation Assessment

Program, which is supported through a cooperative agreement with the Institute of Museum and Library Services. The assessment is a stepping stone toward the possibility of obtaining future grants.

Essentially, the assessment will help the YCHS dream about the future realistically.

"We try to be realistic, but we also try not to be too harsh," Schindel said. "The people who have put years and years into an organization like this — you don't want to hurt their feelings. But we have to move them off the mark. They have to commit to increased resources. Without a realistic assessment, I don't know if they realize how much the move to a new location is really going to cost in time, people

and money. We can figure out how much will be needed in all those areas."

Mensch-Nelson said she is glad to have the assessors at the museum and to utilize their years of experience to inform her own ideas about the museum.

"They will help us make sure we're going in the right direction so we're prepared for a move and the long-term future," she said. "We want to make sure these historical treasures are here for future generations."
