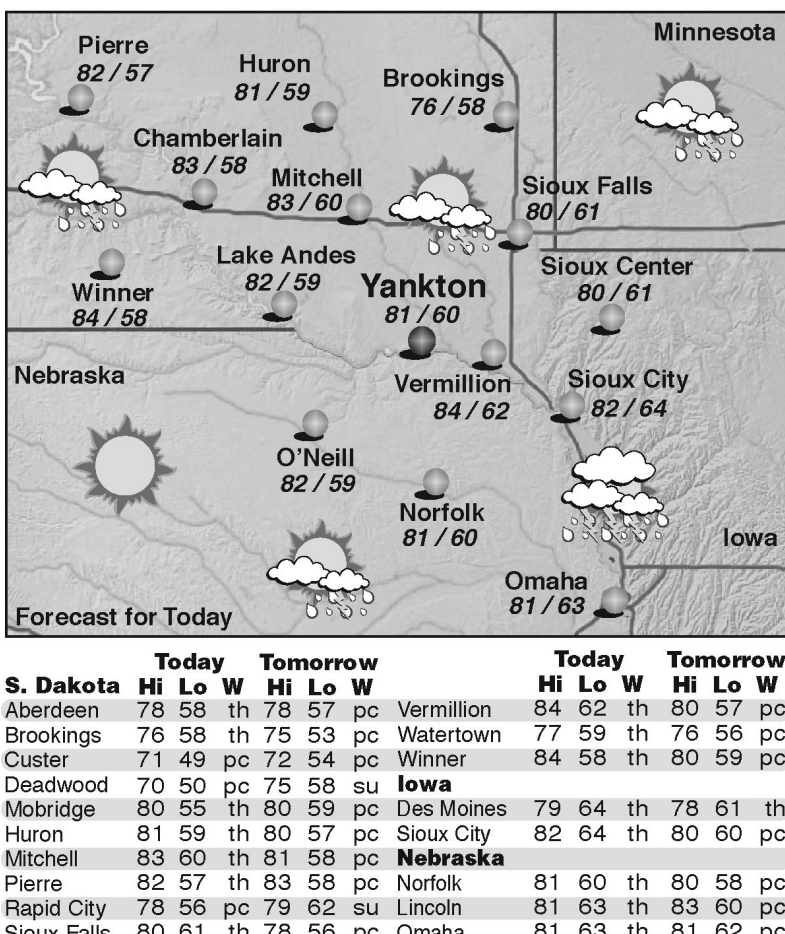

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures shot higher Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade. The U.S. Agriculture Department estimated that the fall harvest won't yield as much corn as first estimated. A tighter supply means higher prices.  
 Corn for December delivery jumped 25.5 cents to \$7.14 a bushel. Wheat for September delivery gained 16.25 cents to \$7.0125 a bushel; November soy-

beans climbed 30.25 cents to \$13.3175 a bushel; and December oats rose 3.5 cents to \$3.545 a bushel.  
 Beef and pork futures also rose on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.  
 October live cattle gained 2.07 cents to \$1.1952 a pound; September feeder cattle rose 1.20 cent to \$1.3630 a pound; while October lean hogs added 1.25 cent to 88.10 cents a pound.

Fort Randall Dam Increases Releases

PICKSTOWN — Fort Randall Dam releases are being increased to 148,000 cubic feet per second (cfs), up 1,000 cfs from the previous level, the Corps of Engineers announced Thursday.  
 Fort Randall will remain at that level in order to maintain the Gavins Point Dam pool elevation at around 1,206 feet msl, the Corps said in its daily briefing.  
 Fort Randall continues to fall 3/10 to 4/10 foot per day, the Corps said. Gavins Point will continue with releases of 150,000 cfs through mid-August. The higher releases will be maintained an additional three days, to Aug. 18.  
 In other Corps announcements:  
 • Fort Peck releases will be reduced to 25,000 cfs today (Friday) with the reservoir falling 1/10 to 2/10 foot per day.  
 • Garrison will be reduced to 95,000 cfs today and 90,000 cfs Sunday, with the reservoir falling 2/10 to 3/10 foot per day.  
 • Oahe and Big Bend will continue at 130,000 cfs, with the Oahe reservoir continuing to fall 1/10 to 2/10 foot per day.  
 • The current rainfall in the basin isn't expected to create problems with releases and elevation.  
 • This week's earthquake near Pierre doesn't appear to have caused problems at Oahe Dam.

South Campground Is Now Open At Springfield

SPRINGFIELD — With lower water levels on the Missouri River, the Department of Game, Fish and Parks announced today that the south campground at the Springfield Recreation Area is now available for reservations.  
 "We were able to open 10 more campsites to the public," said Shane Bertsch, District Park supervisor.  
 The boat ramp in the bay can be used to access the river, but boaters are urged to use caution because submerged debris can be hazardous.  
 Park users should avoid swimming in the area due to high water and swift currents.
