flows and evacuate flood control storage before winter freeze-up," Ruch said.

However, Corps spokeswoman Kim Thomas said the increase should have little impact by the time it reaches the lower James River basin.

"It will be greatly dispersed," she said of the higher releases.

Pipestem Reservoir is forecast to peak Aug. 25 at a level of approximately 1,490 feet, which is 3.2 feet higher than the previous peak this year of 1486.8 on May 25.

Jamestown Reservoir is forecast to peak Aug. 26 at a level of approximately 1,452 feet, which is 0.7 feet higher than the previous peak this year of 1451.3 on May 1.

The record pool level at Pipestem Reservoir was 1,492.2 feet in April 2009. The record pool level at Jamestown Reservoir was 1,454.1 feet, also in April 2009.

The crest elevation of the emergency spillway at Pipestem Dam is at 1496.3 feet. At Jamestown Dam, the crest elevation of the emergency spillway is at 1,454.0 feet.

The National Weather Service has continued its flood warning until further notice for the James River near Scotland and Yankton.

Monday morning, the James River stage stood at 14.8 feet at Scotland. The flood stage is 13 feet. At Yankton, the stage stood at 24.9 feet, with the flood stage at 20 feet.

The river is forecast to continue falling slowly for the next several weeks.

Corps officials have been invited to participate Friday in two flood-related meetings.

At Pierre, they are meeting with

members of the U.S. House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, which has oversight of the Corps.

U.S. Rep. Kristi Noem (R-S.D.) is hosting Rep. John Mica (R-Fla.), the committee chairman, and Rep. Bill Shuster (R-Pa.), a committee member. They will participate in a roundtable from 10:30 a.m. to noon at the Ramkota Hotel amphitheater.

The roundtable will include discussion with the public and other local stakeholders, which is expected to include state and local officials as well as the Corps of Engineers.

Noem and Mica will also tour part of the impacted area along the Missouri River.

Also on Friday, the Corps has been invited to meet in Omaha with governors from states impacted by current Missouri River flooding.

Nebraska Gov. Dave Heineman will host the meeting in Omaha, which is headquarters for the

Corps' Northwestern Division. South Dakota Gov. Dennis Daugaard has indicated he plans to attend the meeting.

This year's Missouri River flooding stands apart from previous floods, said the Corps' John Remus.

"The source of this flooding is different," he said. "It's not from the tributaries from the lower basin. It has flooded all the way down."

While 1993 and 1997 rank as high flood years, this year's flooding already holds a place in history, Remus said.

"Top to bottom, this is the longest flood," he said.
