

ASBSD Announces Certified School Board Members

PIERRE — Twenty-five local school board members are the first South Dakotans to achieve ASBSD GAVEL Certification, the state school board association announced today.

Earning certification from ASBSD's Governance Academy for Visionary Education Leadership, known as GAVEL for short, requires school board members to complete 11 hours of standards-based coursework. The training focuses on teaching research-based best practices that prepare school board members to effectively govern and provide the leadership necessary to improve student achievement.

"ASBSD is proud to recognize board members for their commitment to learning," said ASBSD Leadership Development Director Julie Ertz, who oversees the program. "Becoming GAVEL Certified is an important first step toward understanding the roles and responsibilities of being a school board member."

To qualify for the voluntary certification, school board members must attend training that outlines principles of effective school governance, fiscal responsibility and strategic planning. ASBSD offered

the full slate of events for the first time during the 2010-11 school year.

"Earning GAVEL Certification is more than an individual accomplishment," Ertz said. "It's proof that a board member is dedicated to learning the knowledge and skills necessary to improve student achievement."

The state school board association honored the first class of GAVEL Certified school board members during the association's annual awards banquet, which was held Aug. 11 in Sioux Falls. Each board member in attendance was presented with a certificate by South Dakota Education Secretary Melody Schopp.

situation?" It's all new to me," he said. "When I came here (to Sacred Heart) five years ago, everything was in place. Now, we are starting from the ground up. I am drawing on (the staff's) experience and letting their past guide us in our decision making."

ON THE GROW

The middle school has seen great growth in recent years, Manning said. He cited a combination of enrolling more students in the lower grades and then retaining more of them in the upper grades.

"Five years ago, we had 70 students. Now, we have 145, so we've doubled our numbers," he said. "And we still have room for more students."

The enlarged building will accommodate those larger numbers, Manning explained.

The school may be growing in both enrollment and square footage, but it isn't losing its close-knit feeling, Manning noted.

On the second floor, an open space with couches and chairs offers a student gathering area. The Benedictine Commons provides a place for community.

"We envisioned a place where the students could get together to pray at the beginning of the day or where we could call all of the students together if needed," the principal explained. "We can also use it for study groups or after-school gatherings."

The architect at first balked at the idea of an open commons area for the middle school, Manning admitted.

"Now, he likes the idea, and we could see more of (these commons)," the principal said.

School committees have looked at creative ways of decorating space and giving the new facility more personality, Manning said.

The school isn't totally new, as most of the furnishings came from the old school, he said.

"We are still working to make ends meet and have shown prudence in what we are spending," he said. "Father (Mark) Lichter preaches that we have a new building, but we need to use whatever existing (resources) are available whenever we can do that."

The school was completed in late May, nearly two months ahead of schedule. Manning said he was grateful for the additional time to settle into the new facility.

"I can't imagine doing all of this (transition) if we had just the three weeks (as originally planned)," he said.

Manning works nights on new computer software with a parishioner who runs his own business during the day. It's just one example of people who offer in-kind material and services to hold down costs, the principal said.

The new school is ready to go, but renovations continue at Link Auditorium across the street. The work is scheduled for completion in late October.

The renovations include a unisex bathroom, heating and cooling system, kitchenette and serving area. When completed, Link Auditorium can provide a location for a second lunchroom for students if the parish center is needed for a large event.

KEEPING THE FAITH

Sacred Heart has held open houses at the new school for both parishes and the community, Manning said. However, visitors still drop by for a tour of the new site.

"All the comments have been that this (new school) is wonderful and much needed," he said. "Several (visitors) had deep ties to the old building, but they understand that it needed to go and that we need a new area. They are very pleased with what they see here."

Alumni will find some reminders of the old school. From the former school, the new site has incorporated the statue signifying the Sacred Heart of Jesus,

along with a cross and a cornerstone. In addition, the Sacred Heart sign that was at the old school's entrance will now become part of a planter on the new school's northeast entry.

In thanks for the new facility, the middle school students will celebrate an opening Mass next Wednesday. An all-school Mass for both attendance centers will be celebrated Aug. 31 at St. Benedict Church.

Bishop Paul Swain of the Diocese of Sioux Falls will celebrate a blessing Mass in November for the site, which also includes the Sacred Heart Church offices and Yankton Catholic Community development office.

Manning marvels at how far the project has come since the planning process began in 2008.

"We didn't know what to expect. We started with the feasibility study, to determine if the parishes were able to support the new school," he said. "Now, we are in the second year of a five-year campaign and have raised \$3.8 million out of a needed \$5.8 million."

The new school is more than just bricks and mortar — it's a sign of faith in Jesus Christ, Manning said.

"Christ is the reason why this school is here. That's what drives us," he said. "So many families believe in (their faith) and will make the sacrifices to provide their children with a solid Catholic education."
