



Daugaard Asks For Flags At Half-Staff Thurs.

PIERRE — Gov. Dennis Daugaard asks that all flags in the state be flown at half-staff on Thursday, Aug. 25, 2011, from 8 a.m. until sunset, in honor of National Guard Specialist Dennis G. Jensen of Sioux Falls.

Jensen, formerly of Vermillion, died in a noncombat accident Aug. 16 in Afghanistan while working on a bridge project.

"This was a tragic accident, and South Dakota has once again lost one of its heroes," Daugaard said. "I offer my sincere condolences to Specialist Jensen's family and friends."

The funeral service for Jensen, 21, will be held Thursday at the United Church of Christ, 218 W. 5th Street in Yankton, at 10 a.m. Burial, with full military honors, will be at the Black Hills National Cemetery near Sturgis.

Daugaard also has asked for flags at half-staff Thursday for former Rep. Gordon Pederson, who died Saturday. His funeral is set for 10 a.m. MDT Thursday at the Wall High School gymnasium. Burial, with full military honors, will be at the Wall Cemetery.

Highway 12 Opened From Niobrara To Santee Spur

NIORBARA, Neb. — Missouri River floodwaters have receded to the point where the Nebraska Department of Roads has opened Highway 12 from Niobrara to the Santee Spur.

The stretch of highway, which had been closed since early June, re-opened to traffic at noon Tuesday.

A 15-ton weight restriction is in place. Trucks are required to observe the posted detour.

Water still covers a portion of one lane where flaggers will control traffic. Drivers should be aware that river level fluctuations may cause water to cover additional areas.

Chief Standing Bear Memorial Bridge can be used to access the opened stretch of highway, according to the NDOR office in Norfolk, Neb.

The bridge has remained open for local traffic. However, the structure was closed to South Dakota traffic that would have found no access to Highway 12 on the Nebraska side.

Highway 12 west of the Niobrara State Park remains closed. As the water recedes further, the highway will be tested and inspected prior to opening.

the homebuilders association (LewisandClarkhomebuilders.com) has many links on its website that homeowners can look for without the risk that is associated with unknown contractors.

"Last time, just like now, these contractors followed the storm and did a lot of boom, boom, boom restorations and left," he said. "... It left a lot of homeowners with problems because there is no one to get a hold of, there is no accountability, no long-term accountability for the contractors. That is one reason it is important to use local vendors."

Rettig also said there is another plus in using local contractors.

"We are in a down economy right now, and for a homeowner who is going to pay out a \$15,000 claim with a \$1,000 deductible out of their pocket, it is either going to have an impact on our economy or it is going to be taken out of the community," he said. "If you think about the multipliers and the economic development impact it can have on the economy, the storm two years ago had a multi-million dollar impact — but a lot of that money didn't stay here. What I am telling people is, consider what that money does if it goes into the local system because of using local vendors."

Because most homeowners would not have spent the money were it not for the storm, Rettig said it provides a healthy boost for the area's economy.

"Essentially they are spending money they would not have spent and they get to choose if they spend it local or on a company that is going to take the profits and go out of town," he said.

Schramm also said the first places those impacted by the storm should look is LewisandClarkhomebuilders.com or the Chamber website.

Because any emergency repairs would have been taken care of immediately, Rettig said it is

worth the homeowners' time to wait and use a local contractor for any further repairs.

"Homebuilders are just like anyone else: We have work to do and we add it to the list," he said. "Maybe an outside company comes in and says we will get it done right away, but maybe it is worth waiting to spend that money locally. Think about it from a local perspective, rather than how can you spend the least."

Rettig also warned that a low bid does not guarantee the best work.

"People need to be aware that the lowest bid sometimes gets you the lowest amount of work," he said. "If your insurance says

you can spend up to \$10,000 to fix your home, and you get a bid for \$7,200, then you get a \$7,200 roof. Take time and get the roof that you deserve. If you don't spend the money, it isn't like you are getting the difference; it is another \$3,000 you could have invested in your home."

No matter what, both organizations said consider your family's safety and security.

"The one thing you can't overstate is the safety and security," Rettig said. "You don't know these people. You know the local business people. That is what is in the best interest of the community and is the safest."
